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Executive Summary

Education in its purest form is perhaps an eternal quest for perfection. The ultimate aim of every educational endeavour is to stimulate human minds towards concurring new dimensions of teaching and learning. Guru Nanak College is steadfastly holding on to the tenet of imparting value-based quality education with a modern vision albeit rooted firmly in the tradition of values and culture of our heritage.

Guru Nanak College, affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala (listed in 12(f) & 2(b) sections of UGC Act 1956) is situated on outskirts of Budhlada - a small town of district Mansa in Punjab. To tribute the 500th birth anniversary of "Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji", it was started in 1971 by some eminent personalities of the region keeping in mind the noble cause to make education affordable and accessible to all the people of this backward, rural and remote area. Earlier, it was under the local management but later on handed over to SGPC (Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, Sri Amritsar Sahib), an apex and philanthropic body of the Sikhs committed to serve the humanity, on 09 November 1994 due to having meager financial resources and some other executive problems that has resulted in some significant reforms in the college functioning and infrastructure. Further, the growth of the college took a phenomenal pace since 2008 with a radical increase in the number of courses, faculty, infrastructure and other teaching learning resources. At present, it has become the foremost organization of the area having 16 PG and 12 UG courses (including 03 skill-development vocational and industry oriented courses), 157 faculty members, 6008 students (2437 girls and 3571 boys) with state-of-the-art infrastructure and equipment to provide technology and value-based quality education according to the needs of the hour.

It is rightly said that education is the most powerful weapon to change the world. Good education alone can bring a big change and progress in the society and good institutions can shape the destiny of the nation by moulding the students into responsible citizens. Guru Nanak College endeavours to do just that through providing value-based quality education making the students academically sound, morally upright, spiritually strong, socially sensitive and globally aware. Moreover, the college has also taken a good initiative to start some new skill development courses. It always emphasises on sports and extra-curricular activities for all round development of the students that has resulted in a bundle of laurels which have been fetched by the students in academics, sports and other extra-curricular activities at various levels.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

- ♦ The college is fully committed to meet the objectives, anchored by its vision and mission to transform the students into productive assets of the society which are disseminated to the students, staff and other stakeholders through various channels like college prospectus, website, college magazine, college souvenirs, and Alma-Bay portal, etc.
- ♦ In order to implement the curricula effectively, it uses all its intellectual and infrastructural resources. All the departments hold meetings before the commencement of the session to chalk out a plan for effective implementation of the curricula. All the curricular and extra-curricular activities are ensured to be performed according to the pre-planned Academic Calendar.
- ♦ The teachers are provided with procedural and practical support in the form of proper guidelines to plan and implement curriculum delivery along with required infrastructure such as ICT enabled classrooms, well equipped laboratories, library, etc.
- ♦ To ensure effective curriculum delivery, preparation and execution of the lesson plans and curriculum dairies/course files have been made mandatory for the faculty members. Apart from assigning assignments to the students, regular class tests and internal exams are also given.
- ♦ The faculty members of this college who are the members of the Boards of Studies of the affiliating university contribute in designing and updating curriculums of various courses. It is worth mentioning that the college took an initiative to start B.Voc courses in response to UGC scheme on 'Skill Development based Higher Education', notified by MHRD, Govt. of India under NSQF (National Skills Qualification Framework). The faculty members of the college have developed curriculums for B.VOC courses (Software Development, Fashion Technology and Food Processing) with the consultation of various industry experts to produce job-ready skilled professionals and promote self employment.
- ♦ HOD's and Academic Council regularly monitor the entire process to ensure the achievement of the curriculum objectives. The achievement of the stated objectives is ensured through updated lesson plans & course files/curriculum dairies, submitted by all the faculty members and the analysis of students' performance in class tests, internal examinations, assignments, practical examinations and viva- voices, etc. In addition to this, regular feedback is taken from the students through Class Representatives (CRs).



- ♦ The college provides academic flexibility to its students, offering a large variety of courses to opt according to their interests, aptitudes and career aspirations. The college offers Masters in Computer Science, Information Technology, Commerce, Punjabi, English, Hindi, Political Science, History, Fashion Technology, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics, Music (Vocal) and Library & Information Science. The college offers under graduate courses like B.Sc. (Medical & Non-Medical), B.Sc. (Agriculture), BLIS, BCA, B.Com, B.Com. (Honours), BBA, BA (with 18 subject options) along with UGC sponsored vocational and skill development B.VOC courses, Software Development, Fashion Technology and Food Processing). The college also offers Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications. The college gives flexibility to the students to change their subjects/courses within a stipulated period of time.
- ♦ In view to develop multi-faceted capabilities among the students and to equip them with additional skills, the college has introduced Add-on Certificate, Diploma and Advance-Diploma courses in Computer Hardware & Networking, Web Designing, Spoken English and Fashion Designing at under graduate level.
- ♦ The semester system is followed for all the above said courses and Credit System has also been introduced for all B. Voc. Courses.
- ♦ To enrich the curriculums, workshops, guest lectures by experts, presentations, seminars, group discussions, educational tours, and field trips, etc. are organized. Innovative and current pedagogical methods and as ICT tools are also used to supplement the traditional methods.
- ♦ To supplement the curriculum based learning programme, an emphasis is laid on co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for all round development of the students.
- ♦ Timely counseling, training sessions, industrial visits, internships, competitive exam preparation classes, and personality development programmes are arranged to encourage and prepare the students to compete in the present competitive world. The college keeps on adding new time-relevant courses to match the professional competence of the students with new emerging needs of service sector and industry.
- ♦ The college takes feedback from students, stakeholders, eminent educationalists and university experts and takes all required steps to further improve the curriculum delivery.

Criterion II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

- ♦ The admission process of the college is entirely transparent. The college strictly follows the rules and guidelines, laid down by Punjabi University, Patiala for admission in different courses. The complete information relating to admission process is published in the prospectus and displayed on the college website. Information is also conveyed to the public via advertisements and admission notices in leading newspapers, electronic media, flex boards/banners, pamphlets/leaflets and campaigns in schools and villages, etc.
- ♦ The admission committees are specially formed in order to facilitate and guide the students in opting correct course and subjects according to their interest and aptitude. Admission strategy for the new session is formed after the analysis of previous admission process and the profiles of the students admitted during the last session. The college has transformed its manual admission process into computerized form that has not only made it time saving but also improved the whole record maintenance.
- ♦ The strength of the students in the college is persistently increasing due to its policies and efforts made towards providing affordable and quality education to all irrespective of their caste, creed, faith, gender, area, social background and economical status with a variety of courses, competent faculty and hi-tech infrastructure. As per the norms of the university/state government, a specific number of seats are reserved for the students belonging to different categories. It is worth mentioning that the number of students has increased seven times (800 to 6000) during the last 8 years. The number of rural girls and SC/ST/OBC students has also augmented drastically.
- ♦ The college organizes orientation programmes at department levels to acquaint the new comers with all scholastic and co-scholastic programmes and activities of the college to be done.
- ♦ At the beginning of the session, teachers identify the academic level of each & every student and their profiles are prepared which help the college to mould and devise its teaching and learning practices accordingly.
- ♦ Class tests and informal interactions are conducted to assess the level of the students. Teachers devote special attention to weaker students to help them to keep their pace with the other students of the class. Hence, special remedial classes are arranged for them. Study material which is easy to comprehend is also provided to such students. Advanced learners are also provided with extra guidance by suggesting additional books, question banks, lecture notes, web-based resources, and



other relevant study materials. Special boost-up classes are also conducted for such students. The college always strives to provide congenial academic ambience and facilitates them according to their different needs.

- ♦ Teaching learning and evaluation activities are planned and organized to meet the learning goals, set by the affiliating university for specific courses along with the objectives and ideals of the college. Academic Calendar of the new session comprising all the details of scholastic and co-scholastic activities as per the schedule, prescribed by the affiliating university is prepared and strictly followed by the college.
- ♦ The college formulates a specific system to make the teaching learning process more student-oriented and effective. All the teaching methods and techniques which meet the different requirements of the students are put into practice. To promote interactive and collaborative learning, different activities like group discussions, quiz competitions, exhibitions and workshops are conducted. To develop independent learning skills, individual assignments, presentations, seminars, and case studies, etc. are also given due importance.
- ♦ The college provides all kinds of facilities and infrastructure such as well-stocked hi-tech Library to access printed as well as e-resources, ICT-enabled classrooms, Wi-Fi Internet facility and modern laboratories to facilitate and enhance the quality of teaching learning process.
- ♦ The college provides a fertile ground for extra-classroom learning to inculcate critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students by organizing exhibitions, seminars, workshops, expert lectures, etc. which provide many opportunities for teachers and students to remain updated with all the latest developments in their respective fields.
- ♦ The faculty members provide personal counseling to the students for their academic as well as personal needs. Moreover, personal psycho-social support and extra guidance, if required, are also offered to the students.
- ♦ Apart from class room learning, academic field trips/tours, industrial visits, internships and field experiments are organized along with assigning projects to the students as per the needs of the curriculum by various departments to give practical and real world exposure to the students.
- ♦ Moreover, the students are made sensitized towards social and environmental issues by conducting various activities like expert lectures, seminars, celebration of important days and events.
- ♦ To analyze and improve the teaching learning process, the quality of teaching is assessed by the



students' feedback, parent's remarks in PTMs and the academic performance of the students.

- ♦ The college emphasizes on teacher quality by putting all efforts to recruit and retain well qualified and competent faculty following all the norms and guidelines of UGC/University/State Govt. The college has 24 Ph.D, 54 M.Phil, 55 UGC-NET qualified and 25 Ph.D pursuing faculty members. The overall teacher-student ratio of the college is 38:1 (6008/157).
- ♦ Faculty members are given all required support and encouragement for their professional development and enhancement of their knowledge base. They are encouraged and facilitated to participate in conferences, workshops and seminars. They are also made to attend refresher courses, orientation courses and faculty development programmes to recharge and reequip them. The college also organizes orientation and skills development programmes for the academic development of the faculty members.
- ♦ The college, as per the guidelines of the different curriculums, puts emphasis on a constant evaluation of the students by using comprehensive and continuous evaluation system that helps to explore their strengths and weaknesses.
- ♦ The syllabi containing course contents along with important information regarding internal and external bifurcation of marks, evaluation process and norms are notified to all the students. Teachers-in-charge explain all process and schedule to students in the orientation programme. It is made sure that all activities related to examination are completed according to the schedule provided in Academic Calendar.
- ♦ To ensure fair and transparent evaluation, evaluated answer sheets of class tests, internal examinations and assignments are given back to the students. Any doubt/grievance in the evaluation is redressed by the subject teacher on the spot and if necessary, revaluation is also done. The students can also approach to the Class in-Charge/HOD/Registrar if they are still not satisfied.
- ♦ The college tries its level best that its graduates should possess sufficient knowledge of the subjects, broad-mindedness, social responsibility, rational outlook and good communication skills for their overall development. The entire teaching-learning process of the college including, curriculum delivery, evaluation process and extra-curricular activities, is directed towards inculcating all these qualities into the students.
- ♦ The college follows the curriculums, designed by its affiliating university. Moreover, the course wise learning outcomes are also decided by the university. The teachers and students are acquainted with



them through syllabi and ordinances, issued by the university.

- ♦ The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution are structured in such a way that leads to congenial learning environment, resulting in the intended learning outcomes. All requirements relating to an effective teaching learning are timely planned and fulfilled. Participation of the students is ensured not only in the academic but also in sports, cultural and extension activities. New subject combinations and courses are introduced time to time keeping in view the upcoming job opportunities and industry requirements.
- ♦ The students are continuously assessed by the teacher to check whether they are performing according to learning outcomes or not, with different evaluation methods. Special remedial classes to bridge the knowledge gap, if any, are conducted to enable them to excel in their respective subject fields.
- ♦ In spite of rural and educationally deprived background of the students, their scholastic and co-scholastic performance has been excellent as it is reflected from the merit positions and pass percentage in university results.

Criterion-III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

- ♦ The college is quite inclined to promote academic research temper among the teachers as well as students by providing a congenial atmosphere.
- ♦ The college provides adequate infrastructure in the forms of Research & Information Resource Center, laboratories, library, e-resources, internet, computers, printers, etc., to faculty and students to facilitate their research work.
- ♦ Faculty members are also encouraged and facilitated by providing duty leaves and financial assistance to participate in conferences, seminars, symposia, workshops or other research related activities.
- ♦ The college has a sufficient number of teachers who are either pursuing Ph.D's or guiding research scholars.
- ♦ The college has formed Research Committee & Research and Information Resource Centre to guide and facilitate research endeavors.
- ♦ The college organizes various activities in terms of guest lectures, workshops, conference, and summit by inviting eminent scholars to orient and motivate the faculty and students for research.
- ♦ The faculty members have started applying for financial assistance under minor research projects to



UGC and the institution. A minor project titled "Increase in productivity of crops using Wireless Sensor Network" by Ms Rekha Kalra of Department of Computer Science has been approved by UGC for which Rs. 3,60,000/- has been sanctioned.

- ♦ The college library with Web-OPAC facility has subscribed for N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) and DELNET (Developing Library Network).
- ♦ Agriculture Department has established Agriculture Research Center (ARC) to provide prospect to students and faculty for research and field experiments.
- ♦ The faculty members have a comprehensive publication work. There are about 580 publications of the faculty in the form of research papers, articles and books. They also participate and present papers in National and International conferences and seminars. In addition to this, the students are also encouraged for research activities. Some of the students have opted for research oriented projects in their respective courses. They have also presented papers in many conferences and their papers have been published in the proceedings and other national/international journals.
- ♦ The Departments of Computer Science and Library Science have collaboratively started interdisciplinary online journal titled, 'International Journal of Information Management and Technology' with ISSN 2456-2300. Some other Departments are also heading to start their own journals in their respective fields.
- ♦ The faculty members of the college offer their expertise and advisory services to students, general public and other institutions of the area. The area of expertise of the faculty members along with their professional qualifications are displayed on the college website. The college facilitates its faculty members to conduct consultancy camps, seminars, extension lectures, workshops, etc, on its campus. All the consultancy services are provided at a free of cost as its social responsibility towards the society.
- ♦ The college is well aware of its institutional social responsibilities. So it emphasizes on good relations with its neighborhood and community involving both its students and faculty in different kinds of social activities. NSS, NCC and Green Brigade and other departments of the college engage in many community-oriented extension activities such as awareness rallies, cleanliness drives, tree plantation drives, yoga camps, Crash Courses for Rural Girls, Cancer Survey, Extension lectures on Social Issues, College Festival- "Sat Rang", etc. The college has also adopted one village 'Phaphre Bhai Ke'.



- ◆ Students have participated in different National level NCC and NSS camps such as “National Integration Peace Youth Camps”, “National Integration Camps”, “Leadership Development Camps”, “Republic Day Parades”, “Thal Saina Camps”, “Trekking Expedition Camps”, etc.
- ◆ NSS volunteer of our college Hardev Singh got "Indra Gandhi National Award". He is the only student among all the colleges of Punjabi University who has clinched this prestigious award till date.
- ◆ The college has established linkages with NGO's, village panchayats, local farmers, government departments for various extension activities.

All the extension activities supplement the class room learning by making students socially responsible inculcating into them the spirit of community service. The students

- ◆ are awarded with certificates, prizes and rewards for their achievements in these activities.
- ◆ The college has signed MOU's with various reputed industries and institutes of this area to provide an opportunity to the students to have real work exposure through internship, industrial visits and further placement assistance. These MOU's have also contributed to further design curricula of various skills development courses.
- ◆ The college is also having linkages with reputed institutions and universities of the area in view to use and share their expertise and research facilities.

Criterion-IV: Infrastructure & Learning Resources

- ◆ In spite of a humble start, the college has developed a rich infrastructure, range of learning resources and other facilities catering to the multidimensional requirements of students and teachers.
- ◆ The college has 80 classrooms including 40 ICT enabled classrooms, 08 Science labs, 05 Computer labs, 03 Fashion Technology labs, 01 Home Science lab, 01 Food Processing lab, 01 Agriculture lab, 01 Communication Skills lab, 02 Music labs, 01 Fine Arts lab and 03 Seminar Halls to conduct various curricular and co-curricular activities. All the labs are well-equipped with all state-of-the-art equipment and apparatus to meet all sorts of requirements of the students and teachers. The college has also established Agriculture Research Centre at the village, Phaphre Bhai Ke.
- ◆ The college has about 300 computers to provide computer education to the students.
- ◆ The college is well-committed to augment and update its infrastructural facilities in view of new emerging requirements as it gets reflected from its continuous development.
- ◆ The college plans all the activities in such a way that its infrastructure is optimally used.



- ♦ The college is having comprehensive infrastructure for sports and extra-curricular activities including Baba Banda Singh Bahadur Indoor Sports Complex cum auditorium, open-air theatre, playgrounds, gymnasium, etc.
- ♦ The college has a Girls' Hostel within the campus to provide residence facility to girls and female staff members. The college has its own buses to provide concessional transport facility to girl students.
- ♦ For the health care of staff and students, the college has a first aid center, sick rooms, ambulance facility and tie-ups with two hospitals along with a full time trained medical attendant.
- ♦ The college has required infrastructure catering to the special needs of students who are with physical disabilities, i.e. special washroom, Braille books, audio books, etc.
- ♦ The college has Central Library that is well- stocked with all the relevant printed and electronic resources, including more than 35,000 text books, reference books and general books. In addition to this it has more than 100 scholarly printed national and international journals catering to the different requirements of students and teachers. The college has subscribed for two major consortia namely DELNET (Developing Library Network) and N-LIST (National Library and Information services Infrastructure for Scholarly Contents) to equip its users with all kinds of e-resources, i.e., e-books, e-journals, e-newspapers and e-databases, etc. The Library uses integrated library management system i.e., SOUL to automate all its housekeeping jobs. It provides various services to its users like Web-OPAC, CAS, SDI, Bibliographic Service, Bar-code based Circulation, reprography, Internet, Digital Reference service etc. The library has 04 reading halls and one periodical section. Moreover, the college has also established one E-Library, one spiritual library and 06 departmental libraries.
- ♦ There is a Library Advisory Committee to guide and monitor the overall functioning and collection development of the library. The library takes feedback from its users to further improve its services.
- ♦ The college has all kinds of IT infrastructure having Wi-Fi enabled campus with high speed internet connectivity. The college has adopted all means of information and communication technology to make its functioning smooth, efficient and transparent in both teaching and administration.
- ♦ The college upgrades its ICT infrastructure constantly. The college has undergone an alliance with Reliance JIO for the up-gradation of internet and network facilities using optical fiber technology and latest advanced networking equipments.
- ♦ The college has Media and Content Development Center to help the teachers in preparation of e-



content and train them in handling of ICT based pedagogical tools.

- ♦ The college has spent Rs.66,05,356 /- for purchasing and upgrading computers from the session 2012-13 onwards.
- ♦ The college has spent Rs. 7,88,72,744 /- on infrastructure development & maintenance from the session 2012-13 onwards.
- ♦ Infrastructure Development and Maintenance Committee, constituted by the college, oversees the maintenance and development of the infrastructure.

Criterion-V: Student Support and Progression

- ♦ At every level, the students are well- supported and mentored to groom them into well-round citizens. The college is always sensitive to the needs of the students belonging to different socio-economic backgrounds. Keeping in mind the different financial constraints they face, all sorts of financial assistance is provided to them. The college, in addition to extending central/state government welfare schemes/scholarships for SC/ST/OBC/Minority, also provides financial assistance in terms of free-ships and fee concessions to economically weaker, meritorious, Amritdhari (Baptized Sikh), fatherless/orphans, physically challenged students and the participants in sports and cultural activities. The college has provided freeships, concessions and institutional scholarships of Rs. 2,38,87,342 /- from the session of 2012-13 to 2015-16. The students belonging to SC/ST category got Rs. 3,72,47,853 /- from the session of 2012-12 to 2015-16 under government welfare schemes.
- ♦ The girl students are provided with concessional transport facility to make their approach to the college safe and secured. The college has spent Rs. 14, 91,315/- during the last four years to provide this subsidized transport service.
- ♦ To provide a congenial atmosphere to study and maintain discipline in the college campus, proctorial duties are assigned to the faculty members. The college has different committees relating to Scholarship, Anti-Ragging, Anti-Sexual Harassment, and Grievance Redressal to address the different concerns of the students.
- ♦ The college has constituted Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Competitive Exams Cell and Entrepreneurship Development Cell to groom and guide the students to enhance their employability skills and job opportunities.
- ♦ Special classes for competitive examinations are conducted. It is worth mentioning that our student,



Ankush, has got All India 1st rank in CSIR-UGC NET (JRF) in Mathematics in 2016.

- ♦ The college also organizes personality development classes, workshops, lectures of eminent professionals, etc. to motivate and brush up the students according to the new emerging trends. The college also offers 04 Add-on courses to induce extra skills among the students.
- ♦ The institute has Old Student Association, which contributes a lot to the welfare of the college. The college has also subscribed Alma-Bay Portal to connect the students, teachers and alumni with each other.
- ♦ The college has introduced many new PG courses to promote progression among the students. The students, who are at the risk of dropout, are taken care of by providing all possible assistance. Remedial classes are also organized for such students.
- ♦ The institution emphasizes on sports and extra-curricular activities by encouraging the students to participate in these activities. They are provided with all kinds of support in terms of trainers, equipment, uniforms, kits, boarding and lodging, etc. by the college. The college has two platoons of Army Wing of NCC and 5 units of NSS.
- ♦ The students are given representation in various departmental clubs and committees. To monitor class activities and ensure their smooth working, class representatives are also selected.
- ♦ To provide an opportunity to the students to demonstrate their creativity and linguistic ability, the college publishes its own magazine entitled DUMEL annually. Moreover, various departments have their own departmental and wall magazines which are maintained by the students.
- ♦ The students participate in extra-curricular activities and their achievements at National and International levels have brought many glories to the college. The college also arranges special classes and exams for the participants, if required. The college further boosts up their morale by awarding and rewarding them.

Criterion-VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

- ♦ The institution uses education as a tool for the development of society following its vision, mission and objectives. So it strives to bridge the educational gap among the students belonging to different economical, social, ethnic, and geographic strata of the society by providing an easy and affordable access to education without discrimination.
- ♦ The College Managing Body believes in decentralization and participative management as all the policies and decisions are made collaboratively. All the policies and action plans are framed by the



Principal, Vice-principal, Bursar, Registrar, Academic Council, HOD's and conveners of different committees under the guidance and supervision of Directorate of Education, SGPC (Governing Body of the College) and Local Management Committee. All the staff members work with coordination in order to achieve the mission and objectives of the college. All teaching and non-teaching staff members are given representation in the management as members of the various committees.

- ♦ All policies and action plans are framed with the collective efforts of the Principal, Academic Council, HODs and other various committees and further implemented in the best possible way.
- ♦ The conveners of various committees report to the Principal with valuable feedback taken from the students, parents, alumni and stakeholders that establishes a system of check and balance in the college to ensure that the end users of the policies are satisfied with their conceptualization and implementation.
- ♦ HOD's, In-charges and conveners execute their duties autonomously for the fulfillment of the objectives of their respective departments and activities.
- ♦ The quality policy of the institution is based on the vision and mission of the college which further directs all the activities of the institution.
- ♦ The college follows all the guidelines, norms and procedure, laid down by the UGC/affiliating university/state government to recruit faculty members. The college has recruited 41 regular faculty members since 2012-13 and 10 have been promoted so far.
- ♦ The faculty members are provided pay scales, allowances, promotions and retirement benefits, etc. as per UGC/state government norms.
- ♦ The Management Committee has adopted CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) on the basis of Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) and Academic Performance Indicators (API) for the faculty, following the guidelines of UGC.

It is worth mentioning that the management has given a special increment to its all staff members on 26-02-2014 appreciating and recognizing their performance and contribution.
- ♦ Annual budget is prepared allocating specific amount for different activities which might be increased

according to the requirements. The college has a proper mechanism to use its financial resources wisely and efficiently. The financial management system of the college is entirely transparent. All the major purchases are undertaken by the purchase committees following proper procedures. The account maintenance is fully computerized.

- ♦ The audit of the college is done by external chartered accountants, appointed by the Governing Body and the state government respectively.
- ♦ Academic Council, Infrastructure and Development Committee, Library Advisory Committee and various other committees play a pivotal role in monitoring and ensuring the quality standards regarding the whole functioning of the college.
- ♦ To further streamline the process of quality assurance in all the activities of the college, IQAC has recently been set up.
- ♦ Each and every academic department is given sufficient autonomy to take all its necessary decisions independently under the decentralized set up of the college.

Adequate measures are taken to conserve energy, greenery and water on the campus as well as controlling pollution and wastage.

It is the only institute in the area that has introduced skill development vocational courses. It is worth mentioning that the institution has been one of the 92 institutions in the whole country selected for introducing skill development courses in the first phase by UGC. There is an E-Library in the college to provide the students & teachers with an access to all kinds of e-resources, i.e., e-books, e-journals, e-newspapers, e-databases, etc. In addition to this, the college has also established Spiritual Library to make the students and staff spiritually sound. 1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Keeping in mind the noble cause to make education easily accessible to the people of this backward and remote area of Punjab, Guru Nanak College, Budhlada was started in 1971 by some eminent persons of the area. Initially, it worked under the local management with Arts stream only and later on it was handed over to the SGPC (Shiromani Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee, Sri Amritsar Sahib), an apex body of the Sikhs, on 09 November 1994 due to having meager financial resources and some other management problems. Afterwards, new courses along with improvement in infrastructure were introduced. The growth of the college took up a phenomenal pace since 2008 with a drastic increase in numbers of courses, faculty members, infrastructure and other resources. At present, it is the leading college of the area having 16 PG and 12 UG courses including 03 skill and industry-oriented courses, 157 faculty members, more than 6008 students (2437 girls and 3571 boys) and all kinds of state-of-the-art infrastructure in view to provide quality education to the students. The students of college are persistently bringing laurels in academic, sports and other extra-curricular activities at national and international levels, and thus making the college and the area feel proud.

- To provide educational opportunities to all the unprivileged sections of the society.
- To ensure all round development of the students through extra-curricular activities.

The vision, mission and objectives of the institution are disseminated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders through various channels like college prospectus, college website, college magazine, college souvenirs, etc. In addition to this, they are also communicated by means of various advertisements, campaigns, OSA and Parents-Teacher meetings, Alma Bay Portal, etc.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college, being an affiliated college to Punjabi University Patiala, follows the curriculum designed by the parent university. The college tries its level best to implement the curriculum effectively as per the needs of the students. It is ensured that the teachers, besides using traditional teaching methods, make use of such innovative teaching methods as group discussion, presentation, seminar, etc. to impart quality education to the students. As per the requirements of different courses, industrial visits, educational tours, projects, industrial trainings, etc. are arranged to provide practical exposure to the students. Besides, recurrent extension lectures of distinguished speakers/experts from divergent reputed universities, institutes and industry are organized for the students. Special classes such as remedial and boost-up classes are executed to meet heterogeneous learning abilities of the students. Besides, the following action plan is carried out by the college for effective implementation of the curriculum:

All the Departments hold meetings before the commencement of the session to chalk out a plan for effective implementation of the curriculum. The subjects are allocated to the teachers in accordance with their specialization by the HOD's.

- Academic Calendar comprising details of working days, examination plans, remedial classes, seminars, workshops, guest lectures, etc. is prepared in advance by the collective efforts of all



the departments.

- Time-table following the university guidelines regarding the distribution of teaching and practical periods is prepared before the commencement of the session.
- Preparation and execution of the Lesson Plan is made mandatory for the teachers. The completion of the prescribed syllabi within the stipulated period is ensured by the Heads of the Departments through monitoring and getting the feedback from the teachers and class representatives.
- Apart from assigning assignments to the students, regular class tests and internal exams are held. The results of these tests and examinations are compiled and analyzed by the teachers and the Heads of Departments and corrective measures, if required, are taken.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The following support is provided to the teachers for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices:

- The college provides Academic Calendar in advance so that the teachers can chalk out their teaching activities well in time.
- Most of the classrooms have been well-equipped with modern teaching aids like projectors, multimedia computers, smart-boards, digital visualizers, etc. Moreover, the faculty is trained in the optimum use of these aids for conducting classes in an efficient fashion. The college also owns in-house Media and Content Development Center for assisting teachers to develop e-contents relating to their subjects. Internet with Wi-Fi facility is also made available round the clock for the teachers.
- To enrich the knowledge of the faculty, the college is having a well-stocked and well-equipped library containing more than 35 thousand collection including reference books, text books and general books and more than 100 printed scholarly journals. In addition to this, the library has an in-built Electronic Library to provide the faculty with e-resources, i.e., e-books and e-journals, e-magazines, e-newspapers & e-database which can be accessed through National



Consortia, i.e. N-List and DELNET. The library also renders different kinds of services like Web-OPAC, Reprographic, Current Awareness Service (CAS), Selective Disseminated Service (SDI), Bibliographic Service, Lending Service, Reading Room Service, etc. to cater multidimensional information requirements of the faculty and the students.

- The college encourages the teachers to participate in orientation/refresher courses and faculty development programmes to update their knowledge and teaching practices.
- The college also encourages and supports the faculty members to participate in national and international conferences, seminars, workshops, etc. to keep them in touch with the latest developments in their respective fields.
- To acquaint the faculty with ICT, library and language skills, interdisciplinary workshops are conducted.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The following initiatives for effective curriculum delivery and transaction are taken up by the institution:

- At the beginning of the session, the syllabi are divided in such a way that ensures due consideration to each topic and its completion within a the stipulated time.
- Lectures are planned in form of Lesson Plan in advance by the staff to make optimum use of the available time and effective transaction is monitored through course file.
- ICT based pedagogical tools like smart board, LCD projectors and computers are put at the disposal of the teachers to deliver effective lectures.
- Remedial classes and special boost-up classes are arranged for slow learners and meritorious students respectively.
- To enhance the communication skills of the students, English Language Lab of the college is effectively utilized.
- The students are encouraged to participate in technical events/competitions organized inside and outside the campus.



- With the objective of grooming the students, personality development programmes and special lectures on self-awareness, effective communication, creative thinking, stress management, time management, etc. are organized by the institution.
- In addition to the regular subject classes, the college organizes various workshops, seminars and extension lectures by inviting distinguished experts from different fields to share their knowledge and experiences with the students.
- The students are made well equipped with first-hand knowledge by taking them to educational tours, industrial/trade fairs, exhibitions and the places of historical importance.
- The college assigns proctorial duties to the faculty members to maintain discipline that helps to provide congenial ambience for study.
- While delivering lectures, the teachers also make use of mother tongue, if necessary, to effectively transact the curriculum.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The institution interacts with industry, research bodies and the University for effective operationalization of the curriculum in the following ways:

- The college has signed several MOU's with many leading industries and companies. To expose the students practically, the college arranges special industrial visits for them and such visits facilitate the students in better understanding of the curriculum.
- Experts from industries are also invited for various workshops, seminars and lectures to throw light on the current industrial practices so that the students may choose their professional career. Moreover, the college has set up Career Guidance and Placement Cell with the aim of ensuring jobs to the students.
- To promote research among the students and faculty, renowned research experts from various walks of life are invited. Teachers of the college contribute to various academic journals and present papers in national and international conferences. Some faculty members are the members of many professional bodies and societies.
- The Head of the institution maintains regular interaction with university officials. He is also a



member of Academic Council of the university, meant for approval of new curriculum and relating guidelines. Some of the faculty members of the institution are the members of the Boards of Studies and other committees of Punjabi University, Patiala.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the university? Though curriculum is primarily designed and revised by the affiliating university, i.e., Punjabi University Patiala, the college makes contribution in the development of curriculum through its faculty members who are the members of various Boards of Studies of the university. The college has enjoyed the privilege of having its faculty members enlisted in the Boards of Studies of their respective departments.

The feedback, received from the students, faculty, alumni and industry experts regarding the curriculum is taken into consideration by the faculty members, enlisted in the Boards of Studies of the university and is duly conveyed by them in the meetings, conducted by the university for curriculum planning and designing.

Yes, the institution develops curriculums of the courses. It is worth mentioning that divergent skills development and job-oriented courses such as B.Voc. (Fashion Technology), B.Voc.(Software Development), B.Voc. (Food Processing), Add-on courses in Computer Hardware & Networking and Web Designing have been introduced in the college with the financial assistance of UGC. Keeping in view of the latest market trends and industrial needs with the aim of preparing job appropriate and self-employed skilled professionals, the college faculty in consultation with industry experts has prepared the syllabi of these courses. Punjabi University Patiala has accordingly accepted and implemented the syllabi for the said courses.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

To achieve the stated objectives of the curriculum, the following steps are executed by the college:

- All the faculty members submit their updated lesson plans to their respective Head of the Department by the end of each week.
- Regular feedback from the students through Class Representatives is also sought to ensure the achievement of the stated objectives of the curriculum and the status of syllabus completion.
- To monitor the outcome of the curriculum, continuous evaluation of the students is ascertained through class tests, internal examinations, assignments, practical, viva- voce, etc.
- The performance of the students is dissected critically and remedial classes, if required, are organized for the needy students.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the university’s curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and institution’s goals and objectives are integrated?

To educate the students in a holistic manner and to ensure that the academic programmes and the institution's goals and objectives are integrated, the following efforts are made by the institution to supplement the university's curriculum:

NSS/NCC and various clubs of the college.

- Modern teaching-learning aids like computers, internet, projectors, ICT, library with well stocked quality books, journals and e-resources are made available to faculty and students for effective outcome of the curriculum.
- Magazines are published at both college and departmental level to offer the students a platform for creative expression.
- Students are encouraged to participate in cultural and sports activities.
- Lectures on moral values are also delivered by faculty and various other eminent personalities.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experience of the students so as to cope up with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

To cope up with the needs of the dynamic employment market, the following efforts have been made by the institution to enrich curriculum and organize the curriculum to enhance the experience of the students:

- The students are exposed to new opportunities of employment by introducing new skill development and job-oriented courses such as B.Voc. (Fashion Tech.), B.Voc. (Software Development), B.Voc. (Food Processing).
- Add-on courses in Computer Hardware & Networking, Web Designing, Spoken English, and Fashion Designing have been commenced to equip the students with extra skills in their respective fields.
- The college has started Internal Training Cell for Computer Science students where they are given projects in order to train them in lieu of the market needs.
- The college organizes extra classes on computer literacy, personality development and soft skills, etc. for students.
- The curriculum is further enriched by organizing lectures, workshops and demonstrations of industry experts on current industry practices.
- Inter-departmental tech-fests/exhibitions are organized to prepare the students to have practical experience in event management, marketing and financial management by



encouraging them to set up food stalls, games stalls, IT projects, etc.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The college has left no stone unturned to integrate the above said issues into the curriculum. The efforts made in this direction include:

Gender Issues:

- The college has built "Bebe Nanaki Girls Hostel" within the campus to provide household atmosphere to the girls. The college also provides dedicated transport facility to the girl students.
- The college has formed 'Nanni Chhaan' Cell to apprise the students of the issue of an inverse gender ratio.

Climate Change and Environmental Education:

- "Environmental Education" covering a wide range of topics such as Renewable and Non-Renewable Resources, Eco-system, Environmental Pollution, Social Issues and Environment, Environmental Laws, etc. has been introduced as a mandatory subject in the undergraduate courses.
- Several awareness programmes like tree plantation drives, awareness rallies, poster-making & slogan-writing competitions, etc. are organized by NSS, NCC, Green Brigade and various



other departments of the college to make students sentient about the problems of environment and thus to inspire them to work for the preservation of such precious source.

- The college administration lays emphasis on eco-friendly environment by paying heed to waste management, water management and hygiene.
- The college has set up 'Guru Har Rai Ji Park'. The birthday of seventh Guru of Sikhs, Guru Har Rai Ji is celebrated as 'World Sikh Environment Day' by the college and saplings are planted on this auspicious day.

Human Rights:

- To make students conscious about their fundamental rights and duties, seminars and guest lectures are conducted by the college.
- The college organizes various competitions such as painting, slogan writing on this topic.

ICT:

- The college has five well- equipped ICT labs for the students.
- Most of the classrooms are equipped with multimedia computer, projectors and smart-boards and these aids are effectively used by the teachers to facilitate the learning process of the students.
- The campus is fully Wi-Fi, enabled with 24 hours internet facility to faculty and students.
- To equip the teachers and the students with all state-of-the-art technology, computer literacy workshops are also frequently organized by the department of Computer Science.

The complete information relating to admission process such as offered programmes, eligibility criteria, fee details, duration, core or elective papers, admission procedure, schedule, etc. is published in the prospectus and displayed on the college website respectively. Information is also conveyed to the public via the following means:

- Advertisements and admission notices given in the leading national and local dailies.
- Electronic media like Cable TV, Doordarshan, etc.
- The flex boards/banners put up at the public places as well as on the college boundary wall and adjoining areas.
- Distribution of pamphlets and leaflets containing complete information relating to different courses of the college.
- Visits of the teams of the teachers, before the commencement of the new session, in nearby schools and villages to guide the students about different courses and streams, available in the college.
- The college notice boards are also used to convey all the important dates and other relevant information regarding admission.

The Admission Committees with their defined roles are especially formed under the supervision of the Principal for counselling the students to opt the correct course according to their interest and aptitude. Merit lists as well as waiting lists are prepared and displayed on the notice boards in the college campus.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) Common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The college strictly follows the norms and admission criteria, provided by Punjabi University,



Patiala. Admission Committees are constituted to monitor the whole process of admission. Admission Committees check the documents of students and guide them in filling up admission form. Admissions are done on purely merit basis through counseling for P.G. courses and the policy of first come first get is applied for all other U.G. courses. Admission to MCA is done as per AICTE norms and through entrance test, if conducted, by Punjabi University.

There are one Government, two govt.-aided private, two university-neighbourhood campus, two university-constituent and seven unaided private degree colleges in the district. Among these, the two colleges i.e., National college, Bhikhi and Govt. Nehru Memorial College Mansa, selected for comparison are co-ed, old, well-established colleges of the district and listed under sections 2f and 12b of UGC Act. The comparison with these colleges shows that our college offers a large number of courses in the district. Moreover, the analysis shows that the maximum percentage marks at entry level of students seeking admission in our college is higher than the other two colleges, which highlights that the intelligent students prefer our college.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there are Admission Committees to review the admission process and the profiles of students annually. Before chalking out the admission strategy, the admission process to be adopted and the profiles of admitted students during the previous session are thoroughly analyzed. If any course is more in demand, the previous selection criterion is accordingly changed and even the seats are increased as per university norms. The manual admission process has been replaced with computerized admission process that has not only speeded up the whole process but also



improved record maintenance. These efforts have contributed in streamlining as well as easing the whole admission process.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion SC/ST, OBC, Differently-abled, Women, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other.

- The institution is committed to serve all categories of students. As per the norms of the university/state government a specific number of seats are reserved for SC/ST, OBC, differently-abled, single girl child student. In addition to this, a relaxation of 5% marks is given to SC/ST students in the eligibility criteria.
- The college has constituted Scholarship Committee that guides and helps the eligible students to fill-up their scholarship forms and apply as per the prescribed norms issued by the government.
- The SC/ST/OBC students, as per the state/central government policies, are provided with scholarships and fee concessions. The SC/ST students belonging to the families, having the annual income below the limit prescribed by the government, are given admission at full fee concession.
- The college pays special attention towards girls' education. They are provided with transport facility to make an easy approach to the college. There is also Girls' Hostel in the college campus.
- Most of the college students are from minority community and are facilitated by the college to apply for central government sponsored scholarship. Economically weaker students, who are not eligible for the scholarship of state and central government, are granted partial/full fee concession at the college level. Moreover, the students who have lost their parents are also given some fee concession.
- The differently-abled students are not only provided fee concession by the college but also rendered as per their requirements, all support and facilities.
- The students good at sports and cultural activities are given fee concession.

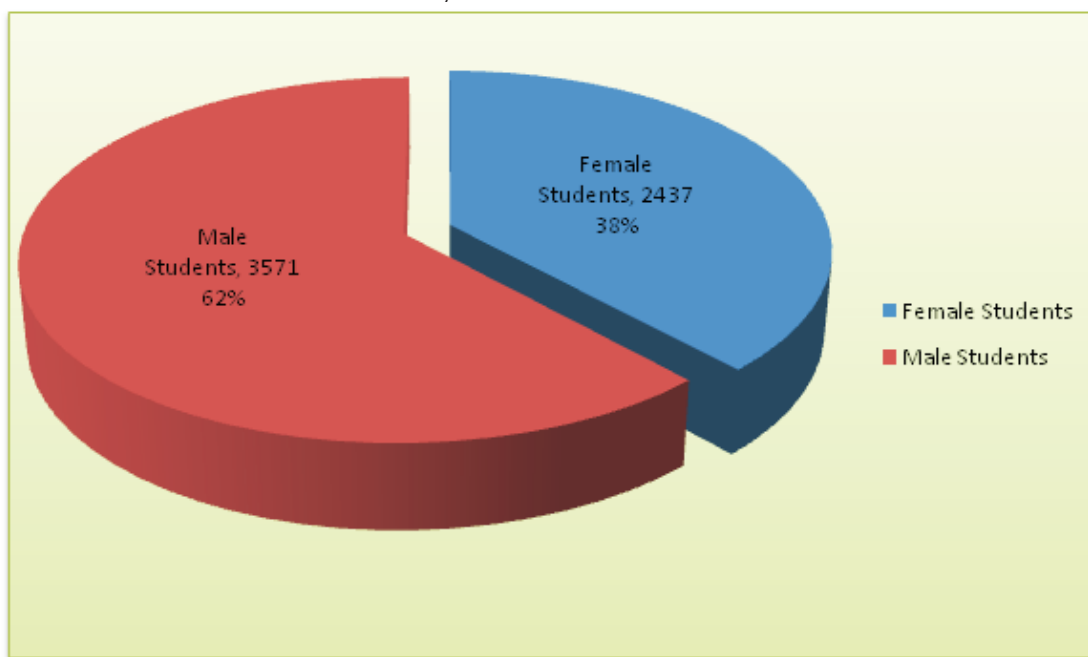


- Moreover, SGPC, Sri Amritsar Sahib, also financially helps the students who are unable to pay their fee.

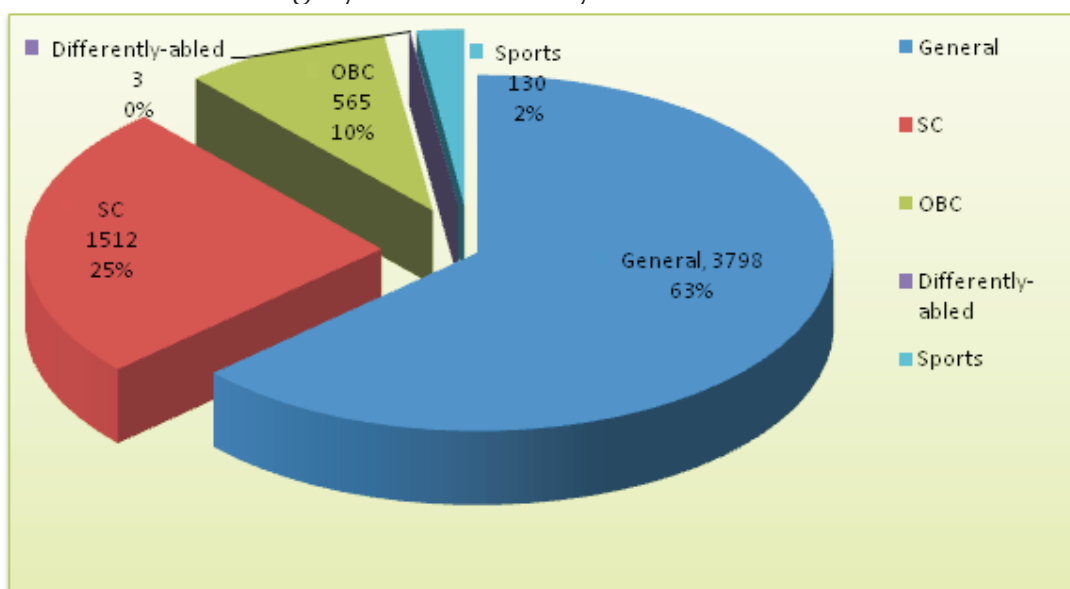

Category Wise Diversity Chart of students



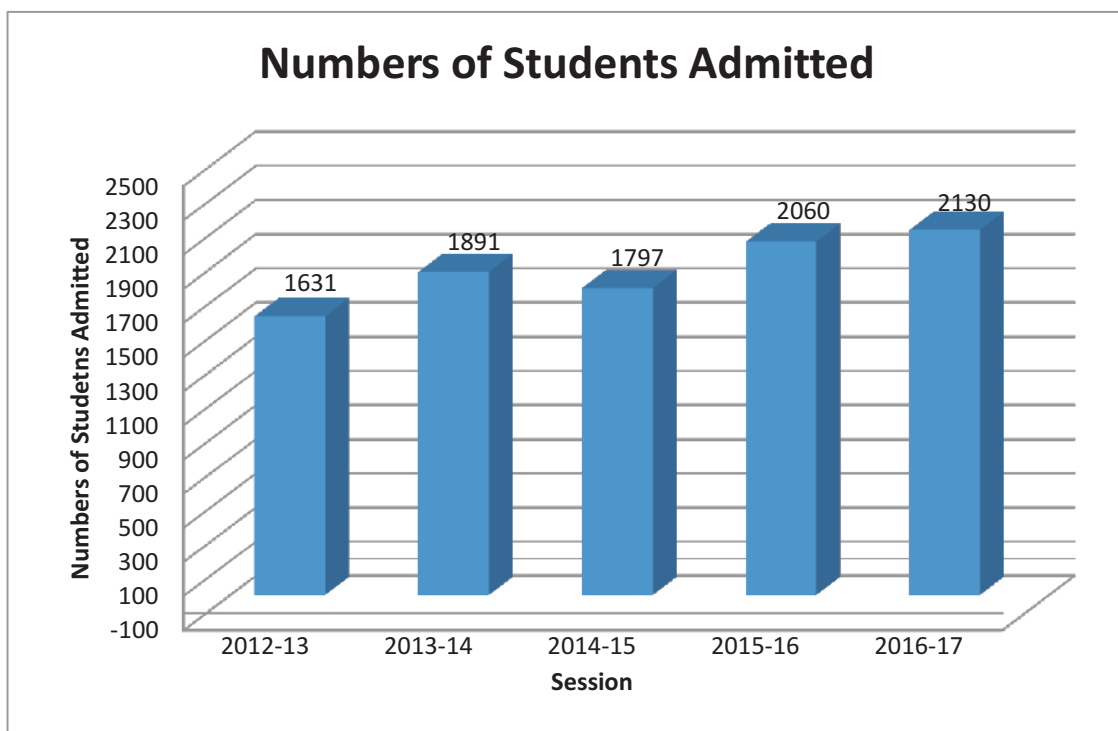

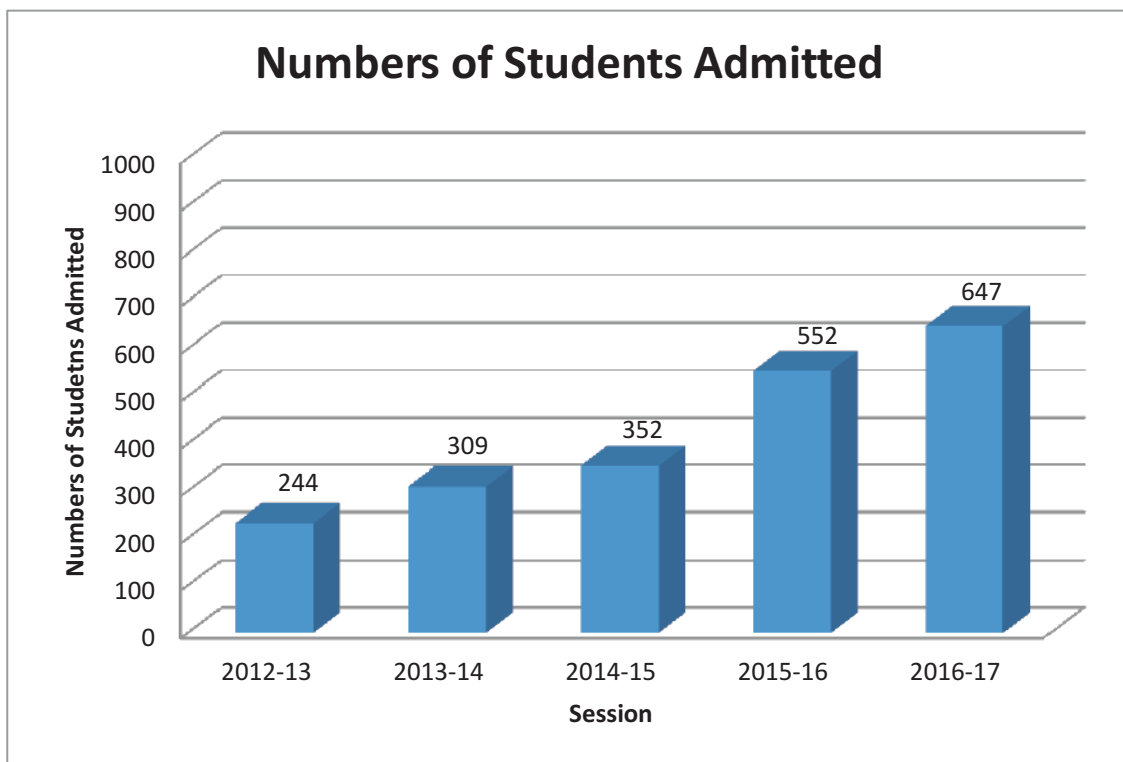

The strength of the students in both UG and PG programmes in the college has tremendously increased during the last four years. From 4165 students in the session 2013-14, the strength has gone up to 6008 students in the session 2016-17. Besides, the number of girls has also augmented from 1506 in the session 2013-14 to 2437 girls in the session 2016-17. It has resulted due to:

- Quality teaching provided by the college, appointing well-qualified and competent faculty. It is worth mentioning that the number of teaching faculty has been drastically increased from 70 in the session 2012-13 to 157 in the session 2016-17.
- The state-of-the-art infrastructure and equipment to cope up with the multi-dimensional requirements of both faculty and students.
- Emphasis on girls' education, facilitating the girls providing different kinds of required facilities like concessional transportation, Girls' Hostel, etc.
- A variety of innovative and time relevant courses which are not available in the other colleges of the nearby area.

All the above factors have overall contributed to attract not only local students but also the students from the radius of 80 kms including district headquarters-Mansa.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution addresses the needs of the students falling under the category of differently-abled by taking the following steps:

- At the time of admission, the college follows the reservation policy framed by Punjabi University and state government. Fee concession is provided to such students.
- Special attention is paid to ensure that differently-abled students have an easy access to their class rooms. Time table is adjusted in such a way that the classes of these students are generally conducted on the ground floor.
- Keeping in view the comfort and ease of such students, the college has constructed a special washroom.
- During exams such students are accommodated on the ground floor.



- Visually challenged students, as per university norms, are allowed to have the facility of writer in the exams.
- They are encouraged and counseled to explore their strength from time to time.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

Yes, the institution assesses the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme through their past experiences and observations by faculty members and feedback from the students.

Initially, admission in each discipline takes place following the specific policies framed by the university on the pattern of state government. Moreover, at the time of admission, students mention their academic records, special talents & participation at different level in various fields. The students are offered subjects according to their choice, aptitude and interest. Admission Committees advises the students, as and when required, regarding the choice of their subjects.

In addition to this the college organizes orientation programmes at department levels to acquaint the new comers with not only scholastic but also co-scholastic aspects of the college including assessment, attendance, MST's, college library, computer labs., smart classrooms, NSS, NCC, and various clubs, etc.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

At the start of the session, teachers try to identify the academic level of each student through interaction. To enable the students to cope up with the programme of their choice, the following strategies are drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students:

- To make students comfortable with the subjects, basic concepts are first of all cleared and then prescribed syllabus is commenced.
- By encouraging peer learning meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners.



- Sensing the needs of the students, the faculty members themselves help the students through counseling, if required.
- The students are encouraged to speak in the class and to read out from their text books so that their language skills may be improved.
- The students are provided with supplementary materials such as question banks, lectures, web-based resources, etc.
- The students are also encouraged to avail library services for reference and other study materials.
- Class tests and informal interaction are conducted to assess the level of the students which further help in accessing their knowledge and skills. They are encouraged to do some extra reading daily. They are also asked to prepare assignments to enrich their knowledge.
- Subject teachers devote special attention to weaker students to help them to keep pace with the class. Special remedial classes are arranged for particularly weak students.
- Lectures of experts are conducted to impart extra knowledge to the students.
- The students are motivated to join Add-on courses in Computer Hardware & Networking, Web Designing, Spoken English and Fashion Designing for developing extra skills.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college is committed to address the social issues such as gender inclusion, environment, human rights, etc. and adopts the strategic methodology to sensitize the students regarding all these matters. The details of the various activities relating to these issues are as under:

Environment issues:

The institution organizes various programmes for preservation and protection of environment. The following programmes are worth mentioning in this context:

- The college celebrates the birthday of the seventh Sikh Guru, Guru Har Rai Ji, as Environment Day and saplings are planted on this auspicious day.
- To sensitize students to environmental concerns, workshop on waste management, celebration of World Environment Day, awareness rallies, etc. are organized.



- Various competitions relating to environment such as poster making, slogan writing etc. are organized from time to time.
- The college has a Botanical garden in the campus.
- The college makes efforts for solid waste management, waste water management, biological waste disposal and rain water harvesting.
- NSS, NCC, Green Brigade and other societies of the college involve students in various activities for environmental sensitization.
- Dustbins have been placed at strategic positions in the campus and the students and the faculty members are motivated to use them.
- Special lectures relating to environmental issues are organized from time to time.
- Punjabi University Patiala has made it mandatory for every undergraduate student to pass the compulsory paper of Environment Studies.
- One healthy practice of the college is that the students as well as faculty members are encouraged to donate a sapling to Green Brigade of the college on their birthday. These saplings are used in the plantation drives.

Gender Issues:

Despite being located in educationally backward area, having female literacy rate of 55% and sex ratio of 883 females per thousand males, the organization is having 2437 female students and 124 female staff members. So the organization is committed to provide a cordial environment where one can play his/her part with dignity and respect, irrespective of one's gender. The organization has firmly stood up against gender bias in and off the campus. The following efforts have been done by the college in this direction

- The college has established "Nanhi Chaan Cell" to make special efforts for the girls education.
- Various seminars and guest lectures dealing with gender issues are organized.
- International Women Day is celebrated by the college every year and efforts are made to enlighten the society about women related issues.
- The college ensures that the girls should apply for various scholarships.
- Lohri and Teej, the famous festivals of the Punjab (especially dedicated to girls) – are celebrated in the college.



- Women Cell of the college celebrates Women's Day by organizing special lectures relating to gender equality and conducts some other social activities to inculcate gender sensitivity among the students.
- Grievance Redressal and Anti-Ragging Cells help the girl students to sort out the issues, if any.
- The college owns Girls' Hostel. The girls belonging to different communities and categories are given admission and accommodation in the hostel without any discrimination. Besides, there is provision of dedicated transport facility for them.
- The college identity card and dress code help in checking cases of any type of indecency by outsiders and thus ensure safe campus environment for the girls.
- Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell has been established in the college to tackle any problem relating to the girls.

Inclusion:

The college is very particular about the differently-abled, unprivileged, down-trodden and economically deprived sections of the society. The number of students belonging to different categories has increased, reflecting the dedicated efforts of the college to accomplish the target of inclusion. The efforts made by the institution in this direction include:

- Various types of scholarships and fee-concessions are given to the students belonging to these categories.
- Uniform has been made mandatory for the students to instill the sense of equality among them.
- It is ensured that no student who has applied for admission is deprived of admission because of monetary factors. To ensure this, installment facility has been rendered to the students. Moreover, if any student is not able to pay full installment, he/she is allowed, as per the convenience, to pay the remaining payment. Furthermore, full or partial fee concession, if required, is sanctioned by the principal.
- Visits to special schools, old age homes, orphanages are organized to sensitize the students to the needs of less advantaged sections of the society.
- The college has a zero tolerance towards the disparity based on caste, religion, ability and socio-economic status.



- Sensitization to these issues is done for entry level students in the orientation programmes.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies and responds to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners in the following ways:

- Advanced learners are identified through their results in the previous class and their performance in different activities like class tests, quizzes, assignments, etc. Moreover, the institution identifies and responds to the special educational learning needs of advanced learners on the basis of the feedback by the teacher concerned.
- Advanced learners are provided with extra guidance by suggesting additional books, question banks, lectures notes, web-based resources, and other relevant study materials.
- They are encouraged to participate in discussions, seminars, debates and declamations to sharpen their intellectual potential.
- National and international journals and e-resources are made available to them in the college library. Moreover, to encourage and motivate such students for research, various departments of the college are in the process to start research journals.
- To assist the students in their career building, competitive exam preparation classes have been started.
- They are given prizes on the basis of their merit in the house exams as well as the annual examinations to encourage them.
- To encourage the advanced learner to attain excellence in the university examinations, they are given various incentives in the form of Roll of Honour, cash and other consolation prizes, etc.
- Special boost-up classes and lectures of experts are organized for such students to polish their talent.



2.2.6 How does the institution collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (Students from disadvantaged sections of the society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections who may discontinue if some sort of support is not provided) ?

The institution finds the students at the risk of drop out by analyzing data collected through their class attendance record, fee record, class performance, parents-teacher meetings, and personal interaction with the students. The collected data is utilized in the following ways:

- The respective teachers take care of the slow learner by giving them extra time and attention.
- Special remedial classes are organized for these students.
- If any student finds either any subject or stream difficult, he or she is counseled and given opportunity to change the subject or course within the stipulated time period.
- Motivational lectures relating to stress management, time management, etc, are conducted in the classrooms by the teachers to channelize their potential to achieve success in their coursework.
- The college makes sure that no student belonging to economically weaker section of society leaves the course for monetary reasons. They are given fee concession by the college. They are provided text books from the library Book Bank for the whole session.
- The students who are at the risk of dropout are informed of lecture shortage through telephonic message, notice board and parents-teacher meetings. Special efforts are also made to counsel such students.
- To overcome communication barrier, if any, of such students, special language classes are organized from time to time.
- Parents are informed from time to time about the progress of their children in PTM's, and if there is any domestic problem, they are also counseled.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

- Academic Calendar of the new session, as per the schedule prescribed by the affiliating university, is prepared by Academic Council of the college. It comprises the details of scholastic



and co-scholastic activities. The same is intimated to the students via notice-boards and the college website.

- College Time Table Committee, appointed by the Principal, prepares the time-table for each department in advance with the consultation of HOD's. is displayed at all the notice boards of the college.
- Each faculty member prepares a lesson plan, having the details relating to the topic to be covered, the kinds of teaching aids to be used in the class room.
- All faculty members maintain attendance register for theory as well as practical classes. Lab manuals are prepared for practical classes.
- The teachers also maintain course file that contains lesson plans, period wise syllabus coverage, periodical test, assignment marks, attendance percentage and internal marks. The coverage of the syllabus, as per lesson plans, is monitored by HOD's. In case of deviation, special classes are organized.
- Evaluation schedule containing details of internal exams is prepared by the Registrar of the college and is incorporated in Academic Calendar.
- The students are also evaluated, as per university guidelines, on the basis of their performance in class tests, assignments, attendance, projects, workshops, viva, seminars, etc.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The college has recently constituted Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) with the goal to provide quality education to the students. Prior to the constitution of IQAC, various committees like Academic Council, Infrastructure Development & Maintenance Committee, Time Table Committee, Library Advisory Committee, etc. of the college were engaged with academic development and quality concerns.

The IQAC plans to contribute towards the improvement of teaching learning by encouraging the use of ICT, upgrading library, improving infrastructure & the admission process and introducing new courses. The IQAC along with the Heads of Departments ensures the proper implementation of Academic Calendar. The course file of each individual faculty member containing lesson plans, assignments, continuous assessment report, and result analysis is reported to the IQAC. The students' feedback about teaching learning process is collected and reported to the IQAC.



2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The following methods are practiced by the teachers to make learning student-centric:

- To promote interactive learning, teachers provide information in advance about the topics to be taught in the class to the students so that the students can pre-prepare themselves for active discussion with teachers during the class. Moreover, teachers encourage students to ask questions in classroom.
- For collaborative learning, activities like group discussions, quiz competitions, exhibitions and workshops are held and students are encouraged to participate in them.
- To develop independent learning skills, individual assignments are given to the students. The students also have to prepare and give presentations/ seminars and do case studies on the topics relating to curriculum.

To make learning student-centric, the following support structures and systems are made available to the teachers:

- The college has developed Media and Content Development Center to support the teachers to prepare learning material enriched with multimedia contents so that the teachers can effectively use the latest equipment and audio-visual aids like projectors, smart boards, visualizers, etc. Besides, Wi-Fi facility is made available to faculty in the college campus.
- To make teachers and students more resourceful, well-stocked library with facilities of e-library, on-line and off-line scholarly journals, and access to e-recourses via INFLIBNET, DELNET, etc. is made available.
- Laboratories furnished with latest equipment and audio-visual aids are put at the disposal of the teachers so that the students can get practical knowledge.
- The college encourages the faculty to attend refresher/orientation courses, seminars and workshops to upgrade their domain knowledge with the new frontiers of the subject.
- To equip the teachers with ICT tools, Computer Literacy Programmes for teachers are conducted from time to time.



2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Today is the World of stiff competition. To be successful in life a student must be equipped with critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The institution takes the following steps to transform the students into life-long learners and innovators:

- Various competitions like quiz, essay writing, debate and declamation are organized.
- To boost the creative talent of the students programmes such as Talent Hunt, educational and heritage fair like 'Satrang' (college fair), exhibitions and tech fests are conducted at college level. In these events, models and projects made by the students are displayed.
- The college magazine "Dumel", departmental magazines and wall magazines provide creative platforms to the students.
- To inculcate the scientific/research temper among the students, they are exposed, under the supervision of the college faculty, to research activities through various projects.
- To inculcate critical thinking, scientific temper and research aptitude, various departments of the college are in process to start the departmental journals/magazines and students are encouraged to write research papers for these journals/magazines.
- Seminars, conferences, extension lectures, exhibitions, industrial trips, educational tours, etc. are organized by the departments.
- The students are motivated to participate as well as present papers in the conferences and seminars held in both inside and outside the college campus.
- The college has commenced a large variety of creativity-oriented and skill development courses.
- The college has increased infrastructure to cope with the new emerging requirements of both teachers and students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources,

**mobile education, etc.**

In modern era effective teaching depends upon various teaching learning technologies. The college has left no stone unturned to make its faculty members furnished with the latest teaching learning technologies and facilities. The faculty members make use of the following facilities:

Smart Class Rooms:

The college has ICT enabled classrooms equipped with modern teaching aids like projectors, smart boards, digital visualizers and multimedia computers. The teachers make use of such aids for presentations and video demonstrations to make teaching effective and more appealing to students.

Media and Content Development Center:

The college has Media and Content Development Cell that facilitates the faculty to design computer-aided course materials like multimedia presentations, video demonstrations, etc.

Library:

The college has a fully automated central library enriched with all relevant books, scholarly journals and other electronic materials relating to different subject fields, catering to the multi-dimensional requirements of the faculty. In addition to this, the faculty members have access to thousands of e-books and e-journals via in-built e-library that has been established by subscribing different consortia, i.e., N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) and DELNET (Developing Library Network). Moreover, all the teachers are facilitated with facilities like Web-OPAC, Reprographic Service, CAS (Current Awareness Service), SDI (Selective Disseminated Service), and Bibliographic Service/Reading Lists, etc.

Wi-Fi, Internet Facility:

The college has high speed leased line for providing continuous and uninterrupted internet connectivity to faculty members. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled so that the faculty member can access internet on their laptops round the clock. The faculty can also use computer labs to access internet for general purposes as well as teaching-learning needs during the working and extra hours.

Laboratories:

The college has state-of-the-art laboratories with ultramodern and sophisticated equipment to



impart both practical and theoretical knowledge to the students. The college possesses Language Lab, well-equipped with all the modern amenities to improve the communication skill of the students.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

To expose the students and faculty to advanced levels of knowledge and skills, the following steps have been taken by the college:

- Extension lectures, seminars, and workshops on different topics are organised by all the departments not only to enhance research capabilities of the faculty members and the students but also to acquaint them with latest trends in their respective fields.
- The students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and latest trends through industrial expeditions, internships, project work and in-house training, etc.
- The college organizes various exhibitions of models and projects, prepared by the students. The students are also sent to participate in tech-fests, exhibitions organized by various institutions.
- The students and faculty members are provided access to journals, books and e-resources, in the college library.
- The various departments have started different clubs to engage the students in different extension activities.
- To boost both students and faculty members for advanced level of knowledge, various departments of the college are in process to start the scholarly journals.
- The faculty members participate in refresher courses, orientation courses, staff development programs and workshops organized by HRDC (Human Resource Development Centre) and other prestigious institutions.



2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

- Academic support is provided to the students from the onset. Admission Committee guides the students regarding the choice of course or combination of subjects according to their interest, aptitude and performance in the previous class.
- Teachers pay special attention to weaker students to help them to improve their academic performance. Remedial classes are arranged for them.
- Students, especially from the weaker sections of the society, are benefitted from the Library Book Bank, from which the books are issued to them for the whole session.
- Career Guidance and Placement Cell interacts with students from time to time and guides them for better career options in their respective fields. The Cell not only offers help for job hunting but also improves their skills and personality by organizing various programmes on communication skill and personality development.
- Special lectures on time management, stress management, motivation and meditation are also organized.
- Grievance Redressal Cell consisting of the Principal and other senior faculty members redresses the grievances regarding personal matters, academic problems, hostel accommodation and health problems.
- Anti-ragging Cell of the college helps to provide safe atmosphere to the students, preventing ragging in the college campus.
- The faculty members provide personal counseling to the students for their various problems.
- Competitive Exams Cell of the college arranges special classes to help students prepare for various competitive exams.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- To encourage innovative teaching practices, the college has set up ICT based modern classrooms fitted with projectors, smart boards, digital visualizes, etc.
- The teachers use, besides traditional teaching methods, visually attractive methods like presentations, video demonstrations etc. to make teaching more interactive.
- The teachers use such interactive method like group discussion, projects and presentations within the classrooms.
- Academic field trips/tours and industrial visits are organized by various departments to supplement classroom learning.
- Webinars delivered by eminent academicians and industry experts are displayed to the students.
- The Department of English has a modern Language Lab fitted with multimedia (Specialized hardware & software infrastructure) and audio system with the prime objective of developing the four major skills, i.e. , listening, reading, writing and speaking among the students.
- Demonstrations on various topics are conducted by various departments to infuse practical knowledge.



- Workshops in collaboration with the different industries/companies are organized to teach latest practices and innovative in various fields.

These measures have improved the teaching learning process to a great extent in terms of participation of the students in the classroom sessions, interest in subject, level of understanding and concentration.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The college has a fully automated central library that provides the faculty and students with effective library and information services. The collection of the library is enriched with all relevant books and other electronic materials, relating to different subject fields, to cater the multi-dimensional requirements of the faculty and students. In addition to this, the library has subscribed a good number of scholarly journals which are very beneficial to the teachers in pursuing their teaching as well as research work. The core feature of the library is its in-built e-library that has been established by subscribing different consortia, i.e., N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) and DELNET (Developing Library Network). With the aid of e-library, thousands of e-books and e-journals can be accessed. All the faculty members are given usernames and passwords to avail this facility. Moreover, all teachers and students are facilitated with the facility of Web-OPAC to find any required library book or to know about his/her personal record. Moreover, the teachers and students are provided with reprographic service, CAS (Current Awareness Service), SDI (Selective Disseminated Service), and Bibliographic Service.

Besides, the college has six departmental libraries, each having its own separate reading area. These libraries are furnished with good number of subject specific books for both faculty and students. There is also the facility of Library in the Girls' Hostel.

The college has established a special Spiritual Library containing a number of religious, spiritual, motivational, moral and value based books to reinvigorate energy and reduce stress of both faculty and students.

All these libraries perfectly augment the teaching-learning process and play a crucial role to quench the intellectual thirst of the faculty and students.



2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

No, the institution does not face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. The college plans its Academic Calendar in advance. The teachers prepare lesson plans before the commencement of the semester. The coverage of the syllabus as per lesson plans is monitored by HOD's. Special classes are arranged in case of any deviation. The college authorities remain in touch with the university so as to be updated on any changes and developments relating to curriculum and examination to prevent any delay and disruption.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The quality of teaching learning process is monitored and evaluated on the basis of academic performance of the students in the class tests, assignments, internal examination as well as external examinations conducted by the university. The academic performance of the students is compared with the previous year's performance and the results of other institutes. The quality is also assessed by the students' feedback, the remarks given by the parents in PTM'S and external examiners who visit the college to conduct practical exams. This analysis is discussed in Departmental & Academic Council's meeting and appropriate corrective measures are planned for the next session.

The college has recently set up IQAC to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning.

This exercise of monitoring and evaluating the performance and thus incorporating the required changes that not only has improved the results of the students but also, made the students and faculty have more research oriented.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The college strictly abides by the norms and ordinances of the university concerning selection



procedure of teachers. The Principal addresses the proposal relating to recruitment of new faculty to Directorate of Education, SGPC, Chandigarh. After due approval, the same posts are advertised in various national dailies and eligible candidates, as per the UGC, state government and affiliating university guidelines, are selected through proper selection panel comprising representatives of Punjabi University, Patiala and the Management Body.

- The teachers are given pay scales as per UGC and state government norms. More over on time increments and promotion are also given.
- For short term teaching needs, in case of certain faculty on leave for short duration, guest/visiting faculty is called.
- For permanent and temporary recruitments of one year or greater duration all posts are duly advertised in leading national dailies and displayed on the website of Directorate of Education, SGPC, Chandigarh.
- Ad-hoc staff is paid better salary as compared to other colleges under SGPC. Besides, the Ad-hoc faculty members who perform well are retained in the next session and are converted into contract after three years. It is worth to mention that interviews are not conducted every year for such faculty members.
- Salary is protected in case of the recruitment of experienced faculty.
- Female faculty members belonging to far flung area are given hostel facility.
- The college takes meticulous care to provide congenial atmosphere for of the selected teachers. The teachers are motivated to attend up-gradation programmes such as refresher courses, orientation courses, workshops/summer-winter training schools, etc.
- To keep in touch with the recent developments in their respective field of teaching and research, the faculty members are encouraged to attend/participate in national/international conferences, symposia, workshops, short-term courses, etc.
- They are equipped with adequate funds to hold and attend such research activities. Consequently, a number of teachers have participated and contributed to various academic journals, written books, organized conferences and workshops.
- The following table delineates the quality of the teaching faculty in the institution.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The institution is under the management of SGPC, Sri Amritsar Sahib, an apex body of the Sikhs. There are 2 universities, 3 engineering colleges and more than 35 degree colleges which are running under the aegis of this management. The college seeks guidance not only from the faculty members of other colleges of the same management where these modern and new courses are already being run but also from the affiliating university. Senior faculty of these institutes and the university is invited to deliver guest lectures on such courses.

To teach such courses, highly qualified and meritorious young candidates having exposure to latest emerging fields in these areas are selected through the prescribed selection panel of the affiliating university. The faculty members of the institution in these professional courses are also encouraged to take part in short term courses, orientation courses, refresher courses, seminars, conferences, symposiums, workshops and other faculty development programmes in order to allow them to update their knowledge and skills.



2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years. Elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

a) Nomination to staff development programmes:

To enhance the teaching skills, faculty members are facilitated by sanctioning their academic leaves for attending conferences, workshops and seminars. The college regularly sends the faculty to attend refresher and orientation courses. The following table brings out the details of such staff development programmes:

The college organizes divergent faculty training workshops for the teachers to empower and enable them to use various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning. In these workshops they are apprised of various policies of the college and acquainted with innovative teaching learning methods such as use of audio-visual aids and multimedia and other ICT tools. They are motivated to persistently work on enriching themselves in their respective fields and are backed up to participate and handle the co-scholastic activities according to their interest.

c) Percentage of faculty

- Participated in external Workshops / Seminars /Conferences recognized by national/ international professional bodies.
- 33 faculty members participated in 119 National Seminars/Conferences.
- 27 faculty members participated in 47 International Seminars/Conferences.
- Presented papers in Workshops / Seminars / Conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies.
- 27 faculty members presented papers in 129 National Seminars/Conferences.



- 22 faculty members presented papers in 46 International Seminars /Conferences.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

- The college has Research Committee in place to handle matters relating to research. The committee not only provides grants for national and international conferences, seminar, symposia, workshops, short-term courses but also ensures proper utilization of such grants.
- The college sanctions financial assistance in the form of TA/DA and registration fee and duty leave to the faculty members to attend or participate in national and international conferences, seminar, symposia, workshops, short-term courses etc. Moreover, the teachers are allowed to pursue Ph. D. and course work.
- The college organizes national and international seminars and conferences.
- The college encourages faculty to apply for research grants from UGC or any other bodies.
- The college organizes research and new technology oriented guest lecturers in various upcoming areas in different disciplines. The faculty members are encouraged to deliver lectures in other institutes.
- To promote research, the department of computer science had started online research journal. Other departments are also in the process to start online journals.
- Motivational lectures are conducted from time to time. All the administrative support is provided to the teachers.

A healthy and research appropriate environment including infrastructure and modern technology is put at the disposal of the teachers to enhance the achievements of the faculty.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The college has recently constructed IQAC to have a close watch on the quality of education being imparted to the students. Ere to IQAC, Academic Council carried on suggesting divergent adequate measures in meetings. The following steps are taken for evaluation of teachers:

- Feedback performas are got filled from the students which help the teachers to evaluate themselves.



- Some anonymous feedback of the teachers is also obtained through PTM'S and the suggestion boxes.
- The quality of teaching learning is also monitored by the Heads of Departments by dissecting the results of MST's and university examinations.
- The annual performance reports of the faculty members are assessed by Academic Council and the findings and suggestions of the Council are submitted to the higher authority for required action.
- The teachers are informed about the shortcomings, if found, well in time so that they can improve themselves. To acquaint them with new pedagogical and ICT tools, workshops are also conducted.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college follows the evaluation norms laid down by the affiliating university. Complete clarity and transparency is maintained in communicating the evaluation process to students and teachers. An orientation program for the students is organized at the beginning of the session. Teachers-in-charge give the students an overview of the evaluation process, norms and schedule. The syllabus containing course contents along with the important information regarding internal and external bifurcation of marks is notified to the students. Besides, Academic Calendar containing the schedule of examinations and other related activities is prepared in advance and uploaded on the college website and is displayed on the notice board for teachers and students. In case of any change by the affiliating university regarding evaluation criteria, the same is notified to the concerned faculty members and is also displayed on the notice boards and college website for the students. The teachers also communicate these updates to students in the classrooms. A link to the website of Punjabi University Patiala is provided on the college website so that the teachers and students can directly get the information relating to the evaluation schedule and curriculum changes.



2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution strictly adheres to evaluation norms laid down by the affiliating university. The university has initiated the following reforms in recent past to make the evaluation process more robust, transparent and effective:

- Semester system has been introduced for all undergraduate and postgraduate courses.
- Internal assessment has been introduced by the university for all the classes.
- To make evaluation transparent, the university has introduced a new provision for the students to scrutinize their marked answer sheets, if not satisfied with the marks obtained.

Reforms Initiated by the Institution:

Internal exams are conducted before the final exams. To ensure fair evaluation, the answer sheets are evaluated through table marking. The evaluated answer sheets are shown to the students and the shortcomings, if any, are discussed with them and suggestions to overcome the shortcomings are also extended. Failed students and the students, unable to appear for these exams due to any valid reason, are allowed to reappear as special cases. The college puts a lot of emphasis on continuous evaluation. For this purpose, the students are continuously assessed via class tests, assignments, and participation in class, seminars/presentation, viva-voce and attendance.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college shows full compliance with the evaluation reforms initiated by the affiliating university and timely implements the same. The teachers and students are duly informed regarding examination and evaluation process. All segments of the evaluation process including preparation of date sheets, setting and printing of question papers for internal examinations, evaluation of answer sheets and internal assessment calculation, etc. are completed in systematic manner.

The college incorporates all sorts of improvements/reforms in the process of internal assessment. The internal assessment, as per university norms, is calculated on the basis of performance of the students in class tests, assignments, participation in class, internal examination and attendance. The Examination Branch of the college and the Heads of Departments recheck and verify the



assessment awards submitted by the teachers prior to submission to the university. The college also makes adequate arrangements for conduct and evaluation of university examinations.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The institution adopts both formative and summative methods of evaluation. Formative assessment is done through persistent classroom performance, which enables both faculty and students to improve their teaching and learning skills. Besides, the students' achievement and performance is evaluated through group discussion, assignments, creative presentation, seminars, attendance, etc. Summative approach is implemented through internal examinations and university examination. The results of the summative assessment are analyzed and remedial classes are arranged to address the gap between the actual and desired outcomes.

The formative and summative evaluation approaches followed by the college to measure the student's achievement have significantly impacted the teaching learning process. Internal assessment component of the evaluation has increased attendance, interest and active participation of the students in learning process. Access to library and e-library has increased. Consequently, results of the students are improving in most of the courses.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The college follows the guidelines provided by the affiliating university to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment. The criteria for evaluation have become more precise and transparent with the introduction of semester system. All the students are informed well in advance about the criteria adopted for internal assessment via orientation programme in the beginning of the semester.

The students are assessed on the basis of their performance in class, regularity, discipline, behavior, assignments, written tests, practical performance and participation in co-curricular



activities. The evaluated answer sheets and written assignments are shown to respective students. The students can approach teachers and HOD's in case of any grievance. The internal assessment prepared by the teachers is verified by class in-charges and HOD's. The Examination Branch of the college rechecks and verifies the assessment awards submitted by the departments prior to submission to Punjabi University.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Graduate attributes in black and white have not been specified by either university or the college. The university has set certain minimum condition that the student has to fulfill to complete the course. However, the college tries its level best that the taught should possess sufficient knowledge of the subjects studied and they should be capable to use the acquired skills in real life situations. Apart from subject knowledge, they should possess broad-mindedness, social responsibility, rational outlook and good communication skills for their overall development. The entire teaching-learning process of the college including curriculum delivery, extra-curricular activities and community oriented activities, is directed towards inculcating these qualities among the students.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

At the college level, internal examination is conducted under the supervision of the Registrar. Evaluated answer sheets of the class tests, internal examinations and assignments are given back to the students. Any doubt/grievance in the evaluation is redressed by the subject teacher on the spot by showing the shortcomings to the concerned student. If necessary, revaluation is done. If the student is still not satisfied, he/she can approach to class in-charge/HOD/Registrar. Discrepancies, if any, are treated with seriousness and adequately addressed.

If the grievance is against the university examination evaluation, the students can apply for the revaluation and rechecking within the stipulated period. For all the said processes, the students have to submit the prescribed form along with the required fee. In case of any discrepancy in the detailed marks card, roll numbers, or any other examination relating issue, the application of the



student is duly forwarded by the college to the university. The Examination Branch of the college keeps following up the matters with the university till they are properly resolved.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If “yes” give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

As being affiliated college, the college follows the curriculum designed by the university and the course wise learning outcomes are decided by the university. The teachers and the students come to know these learning outcomes through syllabi and ordinances provided by the university.

Besides the course specific learning goals, the college aims at common learning outcomes for overall development of the students, which are reflected in its mission, vision and objectives. The students and staff members are made aware of these learning outcomes through:

- The college prospectus.
- The college website.
- The staff meetings.
- The students’ orientation programmes.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme /course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The progress and performance of the student is monitored through the student’s profile, which contains record of the student’s performance in class tests, assignments, MST’s, final examinations and co-curricular activities. Besides, the conventional classroom observation method followed by the teachers is one of the best methods for day to day monitoring of the performance and behavior of the students. The record is maintained at the departmental level and consequently moderate as well as high achievers are identified. The slow learners are accordingly subjected to remedial classes. The record of the results of university exams is kept by the Examination Branch of the college as well as at the departmental level. The progress and performance of the students is conveyed to their parents through parent teacher meetings, departmental notice boards. Course-



wise results of the college are compared with the previous year's results. Programme/course-wise results/achievements of the students during the last four years are enumerated below:

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution are structured in such a way that leads to congenial learning environment, resulting in the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.

- The requirements of new faculty, books, journals teaching learning equipment, software, laboratory equipment, general equipment and other infrastructure are not only timely planned at the onset of the session but also their effective implementation is ensured.
- Annual Activity Calendar stating various academic and co-curricular activities is chalked out at the beginning of the session, ensuring participation of the students not only in the academic



but also in sports, cultural and extension activities to fulfill the institute's objective of the all round development of the students.

- A wide range of subject combinations and courses, keeping in view the upcoming job opportunities and industry requirements, are planned well in advance to achieve organizational goal of increasing economic relevance course /subjects among of the students.
- The students are continuously assessed by the teacher to check whether they are performing according to learning outcomes or not through different evaluation methods.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The following measures/initiatives have been taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered:

- MOU's have been signed with the various companies for training and placement purpose.
- The college has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell for students. The Cell facilitates the students to improve their skills by organizing workshops, seminars, interactive sessions of representatives of various companies.
- Extra-curricular activities such as NCC, NSS, Sports and cultural programmes started in the college, not only enhance, social relevance of courses but also their economic relevance among the students as they get advantage of the certificates of these programmes in various jobs.
- Guidance provided by the recently established Competitive Exams Cell helps a lot in qualifying various competitive exams.
- To make the students job-ready and self-employable, skill development courses such as B.Voc. in Software Development, Food Processing and Fashion Technology have been started. The syllabis of these courses have been designed keeping in view the needs of the industry.
- Industrial trainings and visits provide platforms to the students to learn about various new technologies and opportunities.
- The college has set up Entrepreneurship Cell, which organises various programmes to make



the students aware of various opportunities, government subsidies and schemes, financial management so that they can excel as entrepreneurs.

- The college magazine, "Dumel", departmental magazines and wall magazines help the students to share their innovative and creative ideas.
- Tech- fest/exhibitions conducted by the college provides a platform to the students to explore their innovative ideas.
- The college has constituted Research Committee to promote and support research activities. Moreover, the college has recently set up Research and Information Resource Centre for the said purpose.
- The college has set up Agriculture Research Centre to take various initiatives to find solutions of the agrarian sector problems.
- Professionals/experts from the industry and various universities are invited for guest lectures and workshops.
- To promote research, the departments of Computer Science and Library & Information Science have collaboratively started online research journal. Other departments are also in the process to start their online journals.
- The students are encouraged not only to participate and present papers in conferences and seminars but also to get them published in various national/international journals.
- Various methods such as brain storming and case studies have been incorporated in the teaching methodology to develop research aptitude among the students.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Data relating to the students' performance and learning outcomes is collected and analyzed by the faculty members through assignments, seminars, co-curricular activities and results of internal and university examinations. The common barriers of learning i.e. communication skills and ability to comprehend, are tried to remove by making the week students read text books, suggesting easily understandable reading materials and explaining them right methods to read and comprehend the course contents. Besides, remedial classes are organized for moderate students.



2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The achievement of learning outcomes is monitored in the Departmental and Academic Council meetings through analysis of students' performance in class tests, presentations, seminars, assignments, internal and external examinations. The Learning outcomes are also ensured through the students' progression to higher studies, various prizes of the students in the fields of academics, sports and co-curricular activities and jobs in their respective fields. If the learning outcomes are not as desired, the Principal holds meetings with the concerned teachers and they are motivated to do extra efforts so that the expected learning outcomes can be achieved.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The college has well- established computational and scientific laboratories with latest equipment and software resources needed for research work. Although the college does not have any dedicated research center of the affiliating university or any other agency, the faculty is engaged in research work in conjunction with the affiliating university. The university has allowed the faculty to supervise the students for M. Phil., and Ph.D. in the college campus. Some faculty members of the college are supervising the students of Ph.D. and M.Phil. The college aspires to have recognized research center devoted to research in sciences, linguistics, social sciences and commerce in future.

3.1.2. Does the institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the college has constituted a Research Committee to promote the research activities among the faculty and students. The composition of Research Committee is:

- Chairman : Principal
- Coordinator : Convener of Research Committee
- Members: Heads of Departments

The Research Committee along with the UGC Cell of the college conducts meetings to discuss and plan different research activities and make appropriate recommendations. The Committee collects information about submission of research proposals, seminar/conference proposals, latest guidelines and funding schemes of various government/ private agencies like UGC, DST, ICSSR, PSCST, university and other institutions. It circulates this information and encourages the departments to prepare and submit proposals for arranging conferences/seminars to different funding agencies. It also assists the faculty members to prepare and submit proposals for research grants.



Recommendations of the committee are:

- Research Centre, equipped with all the modern facilities should be created in the college.
- Faculty members should be motivated and facilitated to participate in research activities.
- Faculty and students should take part in conferences, seminars, symposia, faculty development programmes and workshops.
- Faculty and students should write research papers and articles for various scholarly journals and magazines.
- The departments should organize not only conferences, seminars and workshops in the college but also various lectures of eminent scholars to motivate faculty and students for research.
- Departments should start scholarly journals.
- Research facilities at department levels should be enhanced.
- The college should provide financial assistance for research activities.
- More scholarly journals should be subscribed.
- Regular up-gradation of the library should be ensured.
- Teachers should assign research based projects, if possible, to the students.

Impact of the recommendations:

- The impact of the research committee is that many of the faculty members have completed their Ph.D. or are pursuing for it.
- Participation of faculty in national and international conferences has augmented.
- Publication work of faculty has increased.
- Students have also started to participate and present papers in conferences
- M.C.A. Students have started to take research projects instead of regular projects required in their curriculum.
- Teachers have applied and got minor projects from UGC.
- The college has passed resolution to provide financial assistance to the teachers to attend national and international conferences.
- Scholarly journal has been started by the departments of Computer Science and Library and Information Science collaboratively. Some departments are also in process to start their



journals

- The department of Computer Science has started its own Training Cell to give in-house training and provide platform to MCA students to complete the projects, assigned to them.
- The college library has enhanced its resources and infrastructure.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The faculty members are motivated and encouraged to pursue research work. The college has Research Committee to guide and help the faculty members to start and complete the research projects. The principal investigator enjoys the complete autonomy relating to selection and execution of research works. The available resources are timely provided to the researchers as per the requirements to ensure the smooth progress of research work. The college provides adequate infrastructure in the forms of Research & Information Resource Center, laboratories, library, internet, computers, printers, etc., to both faculty and students to facilitate their research work. Required manpower for administrative and technical support is also made available as per the requirement. The time table of the faculty members who are engrossed in research work is adjusted so that they may maximally utilize their stay hours in the institution. They are facilitated with duty leaves to participate in conferences, seminars, symposia, workshops or other activities relating to their research. To meet the information needs, the college library owns a good number of scholarly journals along with a rich stock of books on different subjects. The researchers are also provided with the access to thousands of e-books and e-journals via N-LIST and DELNET. The



institution also equips the researchers with computers, round the clock internet through Wi-Fi and Xerox facility, etc.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The college makes the following efforts to foster scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among the students:

- The college has constituted the Research Committee with the aim to inculcate research culture and aptitude among students and faculty. The Committee encourages and supervises the research related activities in the college.
- The college has established Research & Information Resource Center that can be used by the students and the faculty members.
- The college is running many courses in which the students, under the guidance of external and internal experts, undergo project works. In these project works the students are required to write project reports. Besides, the students are motivated to pick research based projects.
- The college organizes various seminars and workshops in which the students come to know about the current areas of research in their respective disciplines.
- The college invites eminent scholars from different institutions of national and international repute to share their research experiences and inspire the students to adopt research culture.
- Specific research interests and activities are shared with the students by the teachers to motivate them for future research.
- Classroom seminars are conducted throughout the session. Besides, students are encouraged to attend as well as present papers in seminars, and conferences within and outside the college.
- The college organizes tech-fest/exhibitions, where students make and display models and projects under the guidance of their teachers.
- Educational tours and visits to industries & research centers are conducted in order to disseminate research culture among the students.
- Students as well as faculty members are also provided with the infrastructure of the college i.e.



library, e-library, computers, Internet, Wi-Fi, etc.

- Various clubs are established at departmental level for organizing curriculum enrichment activities aimed at promoting scientific temper and research culture among the students.

Faculty members are involved in research activities in one way or other. As per UGC norms, there is provision of Sabbatical Leave for teachers to pursue research work. However, so far, no faculty member in the college has availed such leave. The college grants duty



leave to teachers for attending conferences, seminars, workshops, etc. It has increased the participation of the faculty in research activities.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

As such, there is no earmarked budget for research at college level. However the teachers are reimbursed for their registration and travel charges for attending conferences, workshops and seminars. The college also provides financial support and infrastructure to organize seminars, conferences, workshops, guest lecturers in its premises. The governing body of the college, i.e. Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, has also set up Rs.10,00,000/- (Rupees Ten Lacs only) p.a. in its budget as research fund for faculty members of its colleges.

Yes, there is a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research. However no faculty member has applied so far.

Though there is no direct provision of financial assistance available for students, the college provides them with all resources like books, journals, e-journals, magazines, computers, internet facility, science labs, etc. to carry out research projects. The students are also given small experimental gadgets and raw material for preparing models/projects for tech fest and exhibitions organized inside the college campus.

The college has constituted Research Committee comprising faculty members from different disciplines. To promote interdisciplinary research, the following efforts have been made by the institution:

- The departments of Computer Science and Library & Information Science have started "International Journal of Information Management and Technology" collaboratively.
- The departments of Science and Mathematics have also applied for a research Journal jointly.
- An interdisciplinary journal entitled "Journal of Growth and Development in Social Sciences" has also been applied by the department of Social Sciences.
- Some staff members have done interdisciplinary research.

- The staff and the students can use all the laboratories, equipment, computers, library and other resources available in the college for research purpose. These facilities and resources can be availed beyond the working hours and even on holidays for research purposes.
- All the labs have scheduled time-tables for optimum utilization of available equipment.
- In order to maximize the usage of web resources like e-books, e-journals and e-database through N-LIST and DELNET, Wi-Fi, LAN and internet, facilities are provided to students and teachers round the clock and throughout the campus.

The institution provides all available infrastructural facilities and administrative support to the faculty members for their research endeavors. There is the Research Committee to provide full support and guidance to the faculty. The Committee informs to the faculty about the schemes made available by various funding agencies for minor or major projects and encourages them to undertake research projects. As a result of this, the faculty members have started applying for financial assistance under minor research projects to UGC and the institution.

- A minor project titled "Increase in Productivity of Crops Using Wireless Sensor Network" by Ms Rekha Kalra of the department of Computer Science has been approved by UGC and Rs. 360000/- amount is sanctioned.



3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

- The college has set up "Research and Information Resource Center" that is well equipped with all kinds of state-of-the-art facilities and resources to pursue research.
- The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled with 24 hour high speed internet connectivity.
- The campus has 297 computer systems with latest configuration installed in various departments and labs.
- The college library is fully automated with SOUL (Software of University Libraries) and has Web-OPAC facility for faculty and students. N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) programs of INFLIBNET and DELNET (Developing Library Network) are the consortia, subscribed by the college for accessing e-resources. The library renders Reference Service, Reprographic Service, Current Awareness Service (CAS), Selective Dissemination of Service (SDI), Bibliographic Service, etc. to the students and faculty.
- The college has 23 laboratories such as Science Labs, Agriculture Lab, Fashion Technology Lab, etc., well-equipped with advanced equipment and instruments. These instruments are used for research work by faculty members and students.
- The college has established "Agriculture Research Centre" at village 'Phapre Bhai Ke'.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers, especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The college has been continuously upgrading and creating new infrastructure and other facilities for the students and the staff to carry out research. The college always remains in search of various grants from various agencies and has succeeded to get many grants for the up-gradation and creation of new facilities. In case of non-availability of funds from external agencies, the college itself creates and upgrades facilities from its own funds. The college has recently set up both 'Research Committee' and 'Internal Quality Assurance Cell' (IQAC) to plan the institutional strategies for upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers. The



Research Committee of the college updates every department and their associated faculty members regarding the schemes of UGC or any other funding agencies.

Besides, there are 38 colleges running under the aegis of the Management Committee of the college. The students and research scholars, in case of need, are allowed to visit the laboratories and libraries of these colleges and the university.

The college has a fully computerized and automated library. The library is well stocked with more than 35000 books, 100 printed journals and e-resources like journals, e-books, e-journals, e-databases etc. These resources help the researcher in updating their knowledge. The E-Library section, occupied with 10 computers having free internet access facility, provides a comfortable environment for the faculty members and students to carry their research work. The main library remains open from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on all the working days. The college library is automated by using the software "SOUL" It has a powerful online catalogue facility and user-friendly WEB-OPAC. In the reprographic section of the library researchers can take print outs of their research material.

The college has 'Research and Information Resource Center' equipped with all the state-of-the-art facilities such as computers, internet, printers and research oriented books to facilitate the researchers in their research work.

There are no collaborative research facilities in the college. However, the college has created various laboratories for the students and teachers in the departments of Science, Agriculture and Food Processing, Computer Science, Fashion Technology etc. Besides conducting practicals, these laboratories can be used for divergent research activities. These laboratories include Chemistry Lab, Physics Lab, Biology Lab, Agriculture Lab, Food Processing Lab, Fashion Technology Lab., Language Lab., and Computer Labs. 'Agriculture Research Centre' has been set up at 'Paphre Bhai Ke' village near the college. 'Research and Information Resource Center' has also been established in the college.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

The college has established the Career Guidance & Placement Cell, Entrepreneurship Cell, and Training Cell with the aim of preparing job-appropriate professionals. The college has signed MOU's with various reputed industrial organizations and companies relating to information Technology, Food Processing and Fashion Technology etc. for this purpose. The college conducts expert lectures of professionals from various industries to provide the students and faculty with an opportunity to interact with them in view to know the multidimensional aspects of the industry in the present scenario so that they may accordingly prepare themselves. Training Cell also arranges students' visits to industries and companies, relating to their areas of interest in order to make them familiar with the current practices and working methodologies. The students are sent to different industries and companies for internship as per their curriculum needs. So they get practical exposure in their respective fields.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The institution encourages and motivates the faculty members to offer their expertise and advisory services to students, general public and institutions. The areas of expertise of the faculty members along with their professional qualifications are displayed on the college website so that the students and others may come to know about them in order to avail their services as per their particular requirements. In addition to this, the college conducts extension lectures of the faculty members to publicize its different kinds of consultancy services.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The faculty members are encouraged and motivated by the institution providing full administrative support along with infrastructure and other facilities, available in the college for such venture. The college facilitates its faculty members to conduct camps, seminars, extension lectures, workshops, etc, in its campus. The faculty members are also granted duty leaves, if required, for delivering expert lectures outside the college campus.

The faculty of the college is actively engaged in extending their assistance to the different strata of the society with a variety of services beyond the four walls of the institution. The faculty members render their special services for the social empowerment of the society participating in social activities through various kinds of advisory and consultancy services such as:

The institution is conscious about its social responsibilities. Therefore, it gives its priority to motivate the students to serve humanity and inculcate the spirit among them by involving them in different social activities and community services in order to transform them into good citizens who are capable to shoulder the social responsibilities effectively.

To achieve the above said purpose, the college has adopted one village, namely, 'Phapre Bhai Ke' and conducts various activities under NCC, NSS and Green Brigade, etc. there to develop a link between institution & community, and thus develop social responsibility and community service among the students for their holistic development. At the commencement of the session, the students are informed about NSS, NCC and various clubs by the respective conveners. The students are also made aware about the activities and their academic and professional benefits for them in their future. The information relating to the enrolment in the clubs is properly displayed on the notice boards. The students get themselves enrolled in these clubs as per their choice. The conveners plan the activities of NSS, NCC and their concerned clubs which are organized as per the schedule. The office bearers of NSS, NCC and the clubs are given all the required facilities, including office spaces, to keep the record of all the conducted activities, enrolled students and their participation.



3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The college is always eager to know the perception of stakeholders about its overall performance and quality. The perception is solicited in the following ways:

- The students' opinions are collected by the means of feedback forms and student-teacher interaction in the classrooms.

- Feedback from the alumni is collected in the meetings of Old Student Association.
- The main local dignitaries and eminent personalities are invited at the functions in the college and offered the opportunity to express their views regarding the college.

- The subject experts from the university who visit the college especially for inspection also give their valuable suggestions.
- The principal has an open door policy and is always accessible to the teachers, students and parents.
- Suggestion boxes are installed at strategic locations to receive feedback of the students.
- The perception about the quality of the institution among the community is also solicited through media reports.
- Letters of appreciation received from different bodies such as village panchayats, local administrative bodies also throw light on the institution.
- The feedbacks and suggestions, taken from the different stakeholders, are analysed and incorporated to enhance the overall quality of the institution by taking all appropriate actions.

The extension and outreach programs are an intact part of the college educational setup. The students are motivated to join NCC, NSS, sports and cultural activities by apprising them of the importance of these activities. This is done by acquainting them with the benefits of these activities in terms of extra weightage in seeking admissions in higher education as well as jobs. The college also adequately facilitates their participation, providing all boarding and lodging and other required facilities. The students are also awarded certificates, prizes and rewards for their achievements.

The contribution of faculty is also duly recognized and acknowledged. Teacher in-charges, who render their services for these activities, are rewarded at special occasions and functions of the college. Moreover, their participation and involvement in such activities is also helpful for their API scores and further career advancement.

- Fee concession has been provided at college level to the underprivileged students.
- Book Bank has been established to provide books to such students for the whole year.
- Dress code to ensure sense of equality has been implemented in the college campus.

All the extension activities of the college complement learning experiences of the students beyond the prescribed curriculum and help to transform them into good and productive citizens of the country by enhancing their knowledge and personal qualities. These activities also link the

The extension activities organized by NSS wing of the college such as blood donation camps, cleanliness drives, awareness rallies on social evils & problems, etc. inculcate the sense of community service, team spirit, social awareness among the students. Motivation, enthusiasm and passion among the students are developed through interaction with resource persons, alumni, industry experts and key community people during various extension activities organized by the college.

- A number of camps like Health Camp, Literacy Awareness Camp, Voter Awareness Camp etc. are conducted by the NSS wing involving students, along with members of the local community.
- NSS wing and Green Brigade organize different community developmental activities like cleaning the area, tree plantation etc. in which the student volunteers as well as the local people are involved.
- Different rallies are conducted by the NSS wing to make the people of the local community aware about the social, environmental and health issues.
- The college organizes various seminars and talks on social issues in which the Sarpanches of



villages, the teachers of the neighbouring schools and parents of the students are invited.

- The college conducts various programmes in association with local community. It is worth mentioning that the college organizes a religious function 'Akhandpaath' annually in which all the local people contribute collectively with spiritual devotion. Langar (Free Kitchen) is served to all of them in Pangat (at common place).

- The college has collaborations with NGO's. The students are taken to Old-age homes and orphanages to sensitize them to the problems of such persons.

SGPC also helps the students financially to pay their fee.

- The college, according to the new emerging needs, always strives and keeps upgrading its infrastructure in order to facilitate the teaching learning process in the best effective way. Initially established with limited infrastructure and situated in rural and educationally backward area, the college presently is well-equipped with all kinds of the state-of-the-art infrastructure, i.e., ICT-enabled classrooms, Science Labs, Computer Labs, Fashion Designing Lab, Language Lab, Home Science Lab, Indoor Sports Complex-cum-Auditorium, fully air-conditioned and automated Library, Agriculture Research Centre, Administrative Block, three Academic Blocks, Girls' Hostel, Wi-Fi enabled Campus, etc.
- The institution has a regulated mechanism for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure to facilitate effective teaching and learning. All HOD's put up the requirements of their respective departments to the Development and Maintenance Committee. The college Academic Council and Development and Maintenance Committee chaired by the Principal discusses the proposals of new projects. After due approval, the same projects are forwarded to the Managing Committee for their further approval. Later on, the Principal constitutes the committees to execute the projects accordingly. The college uses the funds provided by UGC and the governing body (SGPC) along with its own resources to enhance its infrastructural facilities.

b) Extra- curricular activities- sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, Cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

- **Infrastructure for Sports:**

The college has a dedicated “Baba Banda Singh Bahadur Indoor Sports Complex” for indoor games. The college has also extensive sports facilities for various outdoor games like Kabaddi, Kho-kho, Handball, Volleyball, Athletics, Basketball, shooting, etc.

- **Gymnasium**

The college possesses a gymnasium furnished with all the latest equipment like treadmill, cross country cycle, jogger, multi station gym, etc.

- **Auditorium**

The college has Baba Banda Singh Bahadur Indoor Sports Complex that has been especially built in such a way that it can be used as auditorium as well as indoor stadium. It is used for organizing various functions like Prize Distribution, Convocation, Talent Hunt and many other small and big events, etc.

- **Open Air Theater**

The college has an Open Air Theatre which is meant to be used for organizing various cultural activities and college functions.

- **NSS/ NCC:**

The college has individual offices and stores for NSS and NCC. NSS and NCC consist of 5 and 2 units respectively. NCC and NSS have all the equipment, kits and other materials which are required to organize camps.

- **Cultural activities:**

The college has dedicated Youth Welfare Department to plan and organize all cultural activities. The Music Labs, Fine Art Lab, Auditorium, Open Air Theatre, etc. of the college are utilized for practice and holding various cultural activities.

- **Public speaking and Communication skill development:**

The college has Language Lab, equipped with all the requisite and modern equipment. This lab is used to enhance communication skill of the students. Moreover, seminar



rooms and auditorium are also used to organize seminars and presentations to inculcate public speaking capability among the students.

• **Yoga, Health and Hygiene:**

The college organizes yoga camps regularly for the students and staff for which the college lawns are fully utilized. The college has a first aid center and three sick rooms with full time medical assistant. Apart from this, the college has an agreement with the leading local hospital to provide emergency medical services to the students and staff. The college has also an ambulance facility. Students are made educated and involved in maintaining cleanliness in the college.

There is Hygiene Committee in the college to look after the issues relating to the hygiene in the college campus. Dustbins are installed at various places in the campus. Pest control and other measures are taken time to time to ensure proper hygiene and safe environment in the campus. In addition to this, the college has Canteen Committee to monitor the quality standards.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

Ere the commencement of the session, it is ensured that the available infrastructure meets the requirements. The Principal, Academic Council and Development and Maintenance Committee of the college assess the availability of infrastructure to meet the emerging requirements due to introduction of new courses, increase in students' strength, curriculum changes, etc. In case of need, the infrastructure is suitably developed and upgraded. To ensure the optimum use of infrastructure, the college activities are carried on even after the working hours or during vacation. The steps in this respect include:

- Various class rooms, besides conducting teaching-learning exercise, are optimally utilized for co-curricular activities. They are used for rehearsal purposes in order to prepare the students for youth festivals.
- The different laboratories are available even after working hours for conducting practicals and



research purpose.

- The college library is divided into divergent sections to ensure uninterrupted and optimal use of it. In the evening the newspaper section, reading rooms and the spiritual library are kept open for users till 8 pm daily.
- Auditorium/Indoor stadium is used not only for games but also for organizing various functions such as Talent Hunt, Prize Distribution and Convocation. Moreover, welcome and farewell parties are also held here. It is also put at the disposal of various government and other community activities.
- The college provides infrastructure to Election Commission as well as government /private agencies for conducting elections and examinations respectively.
- The college infrastructure is utilized as the exams centre and evaluation centre by the university.
- The seminar halls are utilized by the various departments for conducting a large number of activities like seminars, quiz and debates, declamation contests and competitions.
- The college has three cafeterias which are utilized not only during the day but also after the working hours for holding various college parties.
- The college possesses a well-furnished gym for the faculty members, students and local community.

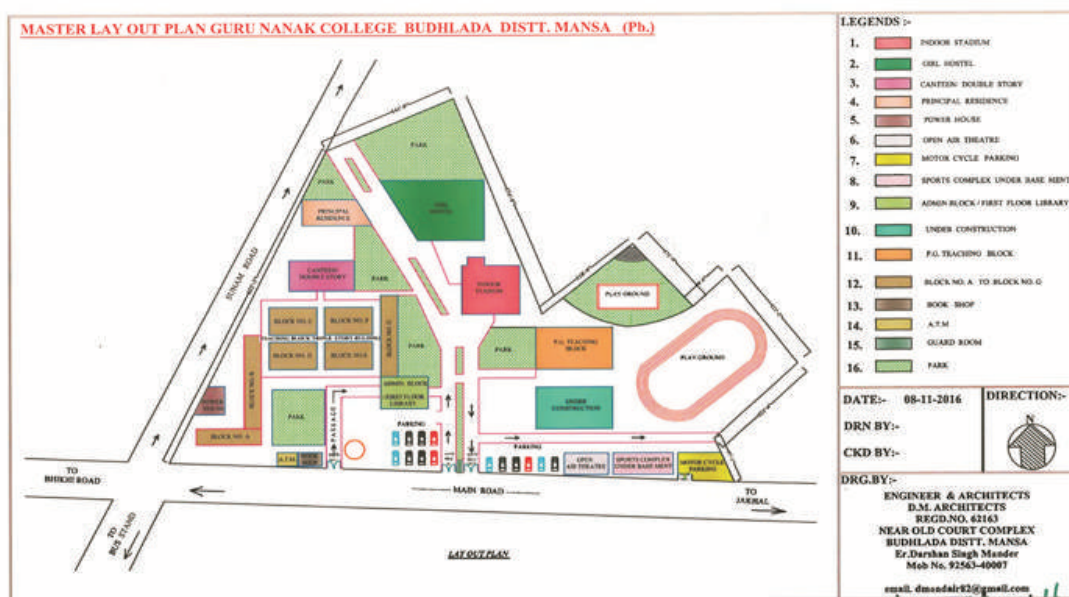

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The college is committed to provide all basic facilities to such students. The college has adequate infrastructure for physically-disabled students. The following facilities are provided to such Students :

- Special attention is paid to ensure that students with physical disabilities have an easy access to their class rooms. For this purpose ground floor classrooms are allocated to such students.
- The college has special washroom for such students.
- The college library possesses Braille books which are especially meant for visually impaired students.
- The differently-abled students are accommodated in the departmental libraries situated on the ground floor.
- The new academic blocks of the college have provision of elevators.

4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them.

Hostel Facility:

The college has a hostel for girls within the campus having 23 rooms with the total capacity of 69 girls. The hostel has all the necessary amenities such as hygienic mess, visitor room, common room, warden house, telephone service, open space for indoor and outdoor activities, round the clock electricity and water supply.

- **Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga centre, etc.**

The gymnasium of the college is available for hostel students for exercise purposes.

- **Computer facility including access to internet in hostel :**

Computer and internet facility is available in the hostel.

- **Facilities for medical emergencies:**

For medical emergencies, facilities such as first-aid room with medical assistant, ambulance facility, tie-up with local hospital are available in the college.

- **Library facility in the hostels:**

The college library reading room is available for the hostellers in the evening session. In addition



to this, daily newspapers and magazines are also made available for girls' common room in the Girls' Hostel.

- **Internet and Wi-Fi facility :**

Yes, available.

- **Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipment:**

There is facility of television and indoor games in the common room for recreation.

- **Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy:**

There is facility of fully-furnished residence for the Principal. Moreover, the female teachers belonging to far-off areas have the facility to reside in the Girls' Hostel.

- **Constant supply of safe drinking water:**

Yes, available.

- **Security:**

There is round the clock security in both the Girls' Hostel and the college campus. For this purpose security guards have been appointed.

- **Hostel for Boys:**

The college provides free accommodation and mess facility to the boys who participate in sports and extra cultural activities.

4.1.6. What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college provides the following facilities to students and staff for their health care in the campus and off the campus:

- The college has tie-up with 2 hospitals. The services of these hospitals are sought in emergency and otherwise. The services of local civil hospital are also availed.
- A First Aid Centre along with three sick rooms has been set up in the college and a medical attendant has also been appointed.
- The college has ambulance to carry a sick employees or students to hospital, if required.
- Pamphlets/advisories about diseases issued by the civil hospital/government are not only circulated among the students and faculty members but also displayed on the notice boards.



- The students are made aware about the various diseases and their prevention and treatment.
- Various campaigns relating to AIDS, cancer and drug addiction are held to spread awareness about these diseases among the students.
- Health check-up camps are organized.
- A directory of telephone/mobile numbers of hospitals that fall in the near vicinity of the college has also been maintained to tackle emergency conditions. Display boards containing important emergency numbers have been installed at strategic positions in the college campus.
- The college bears medical expenses in case of any participant gets injured during any college event.
- The college also undertakes a number of measures to enhance the health care of students as well as teachers. Round the clock supply of RO water at all required locations, regular and periodic cleaning of water tanks and other imperative measures are ensured.

4.1.7 Give details of the common facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women’s Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Recreational spaces for staff and students Other spaces Auditorium etc.

- All the departments have their own office space.
- The college has various office spaces, furnished with all required infrastructure and facilities for IQAC, UGC and Network Resource Cell, Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women’s Empowerment Cell, Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell, Career Guidance and Placement Cell and Competitive Exams Cell.
- The college has special Media and Content Development Centre equipped with ICT equipment to train and guide the teachers to use these tools and help them to prepare audio-visual teaching material.
- The college has 5 staff rooms. The boys and girls have separated common rooms furnished with indoor games such as carom boards, chess etc. for their recreation. Moreover, the college has set up gymnasium equipped with all the modern equipment for staff and students.
- In order to mould the students and staff towards spirituality, the college has established a



Spiritual Library that is well stocked with all kinds of books on spirituality, moral values, biographies of great personalities and their teachings, etc.

- There are three well-furnished cafeterias in the college for the refreshment of staff & students and to conduct parties.
- There is an adequate provision of safe drinking water within the campus of the college. For this purpose the college owns two tube-wells and high capacity water purifiers.
- The college has appointed a medical attendant to provide first aid to staff and students. A first-aid center and three sick rooms have been set up. However, in the case of emergency, services of both civil and private hospitals are availed.
- Baba Banda Singh Bahadur Indoor Sports Complex of the college has been built up in such a way that it can be used as an auditorium as well as a indoor stadium. There is also one Open-Air Theater. These are used for organizing various functions like Prize Distribution, Convocation, Talent Hunt and many other small and big events, etc. The college has 3 seminar halls to conduct various guest lectures, seminars and conferences.
- ATM facility for the students and staff is provided by AXIS bank in the campus.
- There is a books-shop within the campus of the college.

The college library has Purchase Committee in order to purchase library books, subscribe journals/magazines and newspapers. The composition of the purchasing committee is as follows:

The purchasing committee is responsible to purchase the books and subscribe periodicals and other resources for the library. Every department is represented in this committee and all the procurement is made as per the advice of the respective member of the committee.

The librarian seeks the requirement of the books, journals and other materials from teachers on regular basis. In addition to this, the students are also asked to fill the Suggestion Form relating to requirement of books. Subject experts of the university suggest the titles at the time of inspections for new courses. Recommendations are also sought from the eminent academician and personalities who visit the college library from time to time.

The books are finally recommended by the HOD's and duly sanctioned by the Principal.

New titles are displayed in the New Arrivals section of the library. The information regarding new



arrivals is also given through the college library notice board.

Library is kept open on all the working days for both teachers and students from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The library staff provide full assistance to both students and staff members in searching for reference materials like books, journals, periodicals, etc. The library staff also provides guidance to staff and students in using OPAC. The users can also get the reference material photocopied,



printed and downloaded. The list of new arrivals is put on the notice board of the library which informs the student about the latest additions in the library. The library staff helps other departments to set up and maintain their Departmental Libraries.

The college library provides Braille books, computers and audio books to the visually/ physically challenged persons. Physically challenged persons get all needed help from the library staff for availing the library facilities. Full assistance is provided at the ground floor by the library staff to the physically handicapped users. There is also such provision in the Departmental Libraries.

Yes, the library gets feedback from its users. The library has a questionnaire-cum-Form as well as suggestion/complaint box to get feedback from students. - The college maintains its own website providing a lot of necessary information required by student and staff. The website is regularly updated to inform the students and staff about the necessary information.
- The college plans to convert more classrooms into ICT enabled classrooms to facilitate teaching.
- The college plans to set up more Computer Labs as the numbers of practical subjects have increased in each course.
- The college has undergone an alliance with Reliance JIO for the up-gradation of internet and network facilities.
- The Management is in the process of linking all the colleges' database through internet on the Directorate of Education website www.desGPC.org.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

Various steps are taken by the institution to facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students:

- The lot of classrooms, conference rooms and seminar halls are equipped with LCD projectors for screening of multimedia presentations.
- Wi-Fi and internet connectivity has been ensured throughout the campus to help students and teachers in effective teaching learning. Passwords have been provided to teachers and students to access internet.
- Computing facility available in labs and centralized computing facility is also provided in the library.
- Teachers are encouraged to use these technologies and even teachers having expertise in computer assist other teachers in preparation of their lectures. The college has Media and Content Development Cell to help teachers in preparation of e-content and train them in handling of ICT pedagogical tools.
- In-house training of ICT is conducted for the teachers.
- Students are also encouraged to make use of projectors for their presentations in seminars.
- The college uploads internal assessment marks, time table and important news/ events on the college website.
- Usernames and passwords of e-consortia such as N-LIST and DELNET have been given to both



teachers and students to access e-journals and e-books.

- ICT infrastructure is also used after the college hours for remedial classes, boost-up classes, library, hostel, etc.

- The students are provided access to internet through Wi-Fi, all labs and library.
- The students are encouraged, using ICT tools, to make presentations and project reports on the contemporary issues.
- Students are encouraged to learn from e-resources. The teachers act as facilitators by guiding students regarding e-resources to help them in their assignments and projects.
- The students are encouraged to submit their assignments in soft copy to the teachers' e-mail so as to encourage them to use IT resources to save paper. Moreover, the college has facilitated the students to submit assignments online and download lecture notes via its web portal.
- The students are encouraged to download material relating to their subject by using internet.
- The various departments of the college organize conferences, workshops to support students for learning practical aspects of the content.
- The teachers show live videos and animations in the classrooms to explain working of an algorithm or to explain intricacies of a topic. These presentations increase the interest of students in the subject and make the class a lively one.
- The students can use e-library of the college and have access to N-LIST and DELNET.
- The college has English Lab which is well equipped with multimedia computers, audio-video systems and special software where the students improve their English speaking skill.

4.4.2 What is the institutional mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the Infrastructure and equipment of the college?

- Infrastructure Development and Maintenance Committee constituted by the college is responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and general use of equipment. The various departments forward their requirements to the Committee and it ensures completion of the work after due permission from the Principal.
- Individual departments such as Agriculture, Computer, Food Processing, Fashion Designing and Science have technical staff/assistants for the maintenance of the specialized equipment in their labs.
- Computers and ICT equipment are maintained by the technical employees, specifically appointed for this purpose.
- Vehicles are looked after by the drivers and they are sent to authorized dealers for their regular



service and repair.

- An electrician and a plumber have been appointed for maintenance and upkeep of electric fitting and appliances and maintenance of sanitary fitting respectively.
- Gardening staff maintains hedges, plants, trees, lawns etc.
- Peons and sweepers also assist in maintenance work when needed.
- The college has appointed security guards to keep a constant visit and ensure perfect vigilance in the campus.
- The proctorial duties performed by the teachers also assist a lot in keeping a close watch on the proper use of infrastructure and equipment.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Departments have well-qualified technical staff to calibrate the equipment & instruments they use, and they do so as per their schedule and policy. They are continuously engaged in upkeep and maintenance of the equipment. The college has an arrangement with suppliers who make periodic visits for keeping the equipments always in use.

The major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments are given below:

- The sensitive equipments are installed in various Departments as per the technical specifications. Proper voltage stabilizers and UPS are installed to protect such equipment from voltage fluctuations. Moreover, the technical staff of the department concerned takes special measures to look after these devices.
- The college has its own tube well for constant supply of water and proper RO arrangement is also ensured for drinking water.
- The college has its own transformer of 500 kva and Power Gen-set of 125 kva to meet the needs of emergency breakdown and uninterrupted power supply. Moreover, electric panels have been installed to properly manage and distribute the load of electricity.



Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include:

- Fire extinguishers have been ensured at central locations to avoid any type of harm in case of emergency.
- Agriculture Department has Agriculture Research Centre in 10 acre at 'Phaphre Bhai Ke' to promote sustainable agricultural research and studies.
- Keeping in view the new emerging requirements of recently introduced skill development courses, the college has updated its infrastructure accordingly.
- The college has established 6 Departmental Libraries.

The institution is very much bound to ensure its commitment and accountability by adhering to all the norms and rules mentioned in the prospectus in the following ways:

- The college adopts a transparent admission policy as all the relevant and important information regarding admission dates, eligibility criteria and other procedures, etc. are advertised through key national and regional newspapers as well as displayed on notice boards in the college.
- The Heads of various Departments monitor the functionality of their concerned Departments on regular basis and report to the Head of the Institution accordingly.
- Attendance registers of the students are maintained systematically to ensure their regularity.
- The students are provided with all the facilities, especially mentioned in the prospectus, i.e. access to fully computerized and well equipped central library, smart class rooms, indoor stadium, gym and sports grounds, etc.
- In addition to this, assignments, class tests and house tests, etc. provide proper feedback on students performance.
- Students are always encouraged to participate in sports and cultural activities.
- It is worth mentioning that Academic Council and IQAC play an active role as regulatory bodies to ensure the smooth functioning of academic as well as administrative activities of the institution.
- Moreover, various Committees are formulated in the beginning of the session so that they can initiate the work at the commencement of the new session. Here, each Committee is



supposed to ensure that all the rules and regulations are properly implemented.

- The Principal further monitors the working of all the Committees and Departments to ensure that they all perform their duties efficiently and smoothly.

Students from different socio-economic background of the society get admission in the college. The needy and deserving ones are especially picked up and taken care of by providing them all financial help. - The college has made available scholarship and free ship schemes to all eligible students who belong to SC/ST, OBC and other economically weaker sections. Though the government allows college to receive full fee from the students and the scholarship amount to be disbursed to students by Direct Benefit transfer mechanism, SC/ST students are given admission by the college without fee whereas reimbursement of the said amount is received through the government after a long period of time.
- In addition to this, the students who belong to economically weaker sections of the society are also given fee concessions by the institution.
- Besides, a certain number of seats, as per the state government/ university norms, are also reserved for such students.
- These students are also facilitated with free books from the Book Bank for the whole session.

**Students with physical disabilities:**

Our college is highly concerned towards the specific requirements of the students with physical disabilities. Such students are provided with special facilities to ensure that they do not face any difficulty in the institution. They are facilitated in the following ways:

- Seats, as per government norms, are especially reserved for physically disabled students in the college.
- The institute tries to provide ground floor classrooms to students with physical disabilities. Moreover, during exams their seating arrangement is also planned on the ground floor.
- Their comfortable access to the classes, labs and the library is ensured.
- Keeping in view their specific requirements, special washroom has been provided to them.
- The college library is having Braille books required for the visually impaired students.
- Faculty members put all the efforts in order to make the differently-abled students capable so that they can compete with other students.
- Transport facility along with fee concession is provided to such students.

Overseas students:

Presently, the college has no overseas student but our college is ever committed to offer all the required facilities and support to them if any such case comes up in future.

Students to participate in various competitions/national and international:

The college always encourages and motivates the students to participate in various national and international competitions relating to different fields like academics, sports and co-curricular activities, etc. In addition to this, the following facilities and support are rendered to them under various categories:

- All possible infrastructural support and financial aids are especially offered to the participating students.
- The college also hires experts and trainers to prepare the students for competition and enhance the talent of the students in various sports and cultural activities.
- Participants of sports and cultural activities are provided not only apparel kits and other necessary equipment but also TA/DA and accommodation.
- Such students are also provided fee concession.



- Special classes are arranged for the students who have to miss their classes during the rehearsals, training camps and competitions, etc. Moreover, university exams of students who miss these exams due to participation in various competitions are also organized with special permission from the university.

Medical Assistance to the students:

- The college provides medical services to both students and staff members.
- Medical attendant is available in the college.
- The college has a First Aid Center and three sick rooms for minor ailments.
- The college has tie-ups with the two leading hospitals in the city and ambulance facility for medical emergencies.
- Free medical support is also provided during all the college events like sports, fests, etc.
- The college bears medical expenditure in case a student gets injured during performance and practice in sports and cultural activities. It is worth mentioning that the college has borne the whole medical expenses, amounted approximately Rs.1,75,000/- to provide medical assistance to the student who got seriously injured during the performance of youth festival.
- Moreover, lectures on important issues like nutrition, drug abuse, remedies for depression, stress and eating disorders, etc. are conducted in the college.

Coaching classes of competitive exams:

The college is very much inclined to prepare its students for different types of competitive exams and interviews for different jobs through its Competitive Exams Cell. This Cell organizes various competitive classes to prepare the students for hard challenges in the competitive world. The college conducts various workshops and guest-lectures from eminent personalities to guide and motivate the students. Moreover, there is a separate corner in the library for competitive exams. This corner contains many books and magazines relating to different competitive exams.

Skill Development Programme:

- To impart computer skills, Add-on-courses in Computer Hardware and Networking and Web Designing have been started in this institute.
- The college has started Add-on-course in Spoken English for UG students, which is very beneficial for the students to improve their communication skill. In addition to this, the college



has an English Communication Lab, well-equipped with all kinds of latest technology.

- The college also offers Add on course in Fashion Designing.
- Career Guidance and Placement Cell organizes workshops, lectures and special classes to train the students for group discussions, interviews and overall personality development, etc.
- To improve language skill, managerial skill and presentation skills among the students, different activities like presentations, essay writing competitions, debates etc. are organized by various departments.

Support for “slow learners”:

In order to support the slow learners, special remedial classes are arranged for them. They are initially identified on the basis of their performance in internal exams and regular class tests. Accordingly, the slow learners are personally counseled by the concerned teachers. Moreover, the meetings with parents of slow learners are also regularly carried on. In addition to this, the students' performance records are regularly conveyed to parents to keep them updated with the academic performance of their wards.

Exposures of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/ business houses, etc.:

The college organizes industrial training programmes and various visits for the students to various business/corporate/industrial houses in order to make them familiar with their working. The college provides free transport facility to the students. Moreover, the college arranges the lectures of business/industry experts to interact with the students.

Publication of student magazines:

The students are encouraged to show their talent and potential through their writings in 'Dumel'-an annual college magazine. Moreover, the various Departments of the college publish their departmental magazines containing the creative writings of the students.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The college has formed Entrepreneurship Cell with the motive of promoting entrepreneurship and self-employability among the students. The students are apprised of the latest information



about the industry and occupations they can adopt. The Cell makes them understand the employability options and how they can create better opportunities for them as well as for others. To achieve this purpose, the following steps are taken:

- Various guest lectures and talks are organized by the Cell by inviting distinguished entrepreneurs who share their experiences and knowledge with the students and thus inspire them.
- The bank officials are invited to spread awareness among the students about the various kinds of available loans & subsidies to start a new business.
- The students are also provided latest information about the divergent self-employment schemes of the government.
- To promote self-employability and skill development, the college has started many skill development courses such as B.Voc (Software Development), B.Voc (Food Processing), B.Voc (Fashion Technology) and Add-on courses in Computer Hardworking, Web Designing, and Communication Skill.
- Industrial visits and internships are organized for the students to expose them to practical knowledge.

Besides getting jobs in many private and government institutions, a number of students have successfully started their own business and some are taking their paternal business to the new heights. For example, some students of Fashion Designing have started their own boutiques.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

- **Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations**
- **Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials**
- **Any other**

The college pays special attention to extra-curricular and co-curricular activities as they play a pivotal role in the all-round development of the students. The students have dominantly participated and performed in cultural activities, sports, NCC, NSS etc. Effective participation of



the students in these activities is ensured by adopting the following policies and strategies:

- At the very onset of the session, the students are apprised of extra-curricular, co-curricular activities through notices and class announcements. All these activities are also displayed on the college website. The students are encouraged to participate by making them sentient about the various benefits of such activities.
- Youth Welfare Department of the college organizes Talent Hunt to identify the talented students in various cultural, literary, theatrical, musical items etc. For sports events the players are selected on the basis of their performance in the trials.
- The in-charges are deputed to prepare the selected students for respective items of the competitions. Moreover, the renowned experts are hired to groom the students in these activities.
- Not only all the required equipment and infrastructure but also boarding and lodging facility is provided by the college.
- Such students are facilitated with fee concession. Moreover, TA/DA and transport facility are provided whenever such students go to participate in competitions outside the college campus.
- They are trained under the guidance and supervision of coaches in the special training camps and thus they are made capable enough not only to participate but also to perform well in the competitions.
- The students who have to miss their classes or house examinations while participating in cultural and co-curricular activities are not only allowed to appear in special internal exams but also special classes are organized for such students.
- Participants in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities who are unable to appear in normally scheduled university examinations are allowed to appear in specially scheduled university examinations with the permission of the university.
- To appreciate the winners, their names are displayed on the information bulletin boards and are published in the leading dailies. They are also awarded in the college functions.



5.1.7. Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR-NET, UGC-NET, SLET, GATE / CAT / GRE / TOEFL / GMAT / Central/State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

The college has started Competitive Exams Cell. It organizes guest lectures by inviting prominent achievers. Short term workshops and special coaching classes are also conducted. A book shelf containing various competitive books has been earmarked for this purpose in the central library.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The college provides counselling to the students whenever they require it. The students are individually guided by the teachers inside as well as outside the classrooms. Teachers help the students with their academic, personal, career-related, psycho-social problems.

- Admission Committees of the college counsel the students at the time of admissions in choosing the appropriate courses/subject combinations according to their aptitude and interests. The Committees provide all the relevant information regarding the courses/subjects including the scope and future prospects.
- The students are also guided about NSS, NCC, sports activities, cultural activities, etc. available in the college along with their benefits.
- The college conducts Information Literacy Programme for the students in which the students are made aware about the latest ICT and learning resources such as library, Communication Lab, online learning resources, etc.
- Career Guidance and Placement Cell adequately guides the students to shape their career. They are apprised of the available career options. Special guest lectures and seminars are conducted on technical, communication and other skills to prepare students to face interviews and get jobs.
- Students are also made aware about the higher education options available after the completion of their present course.
- Competitive Exams Cell of the college provides guidance to appear in various competitive examinations.
- NSS, NCC and various clubs play a vital role in providing psycho-counseling to the students.



Students are sensitized about the social and ethical issues.

- Guest lectures on topics such as personality development, time management, stress management, etc. are organized by various departments of the college.
- The college has Anti-ragging, Grievance Redressal, Anti-Sexual Harassment Cells to handle personal problems and complaints of the students. To make the students vigilant about ragging and sexual harassment, special lectures are conducted.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

Yes, the college has a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students. The college has Career Guidance and Placement Cell to facilitate the students to get jobs. It has been modernized with all the latest technological instruments such as computer, printer, scanner etc. The following services are provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare them not only to face but also to crack interviews:

- A Language Lab to sharpen the communication skill of the students has been set up. This Lab is equipped with special software and hardware relating to soft skills.
- Experts from industry are invited for guest lecturers in which they acquaint the students with different skills required to get jobs.
- Eminent personalities having expertise in the field of personality development are invited to deliver lectures on time management, stress management, interview skill, aptitude etc.
- Students are taken for industrial visits to equip them with latest market trends.
- Workshops relating to latest technology are conducted to give practical knowledge needed to get jobs.
- Leaflets/job advertisements of government and private sectors are displayed on the notice boards.
- To assist the students in getting jobs, classes of various competitions are organized by Competitive Exams Cell.
- The students are taken to various placement drives conducted by different institutes.



5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the institution has a Grievance Redressal Cell to address and sort out the written as well as oral grievances/complaints of the students. The students can drop their written grievances into the suggestion/complaint boxes installed at various strategic places in the college. The students can also directly approach the Principal and the Heads of the Department and Grievance Cell members to file their complaints. After the careful deliberation, the imperative actions, if required, are ensured to the satisfaction of the complaint lodgers.

Some of the grievances relating to crowded fee counters, discrepancies in certificates/results, time-table, shortage of classrooms, washroom conditions, transportation parking, cafeteria, cleanliness, discipline, library, drinking water, etc. had been reported and addressed during the last four years.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The institution has an Anti-sexual Harassment Cell consisting of senior female staff members, which deals with cases pertaining to sexual harassment. Besides, the following measures are taken to prevent any case of sexual harassment:

- Every teacher is assigned proctorial duty to keep a close eye on the students.
- Security at the college entry gate and in the girls' hostel has been ensured.
- CCTV cameras have been installed at the focal points.
- Awareness lectures relating to this topic are conducted.
- Separate canteen, lawn and common room have been earmarked for the girls.
- Dedicated transport facility with CCTV surveillance is provided to female students.

5.1.12 Is there an Anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, there is an Anti-Ragging Cell in the college. The students are made aware about the menace of ragging and its legal consequences. Notices and warnings about ragging are put up at various places in the campus. Consequently, no instance of ragging has taken place both in the college and the hostel during the last four years.

**5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.**

Besides extending the welfare schemes/scholarships of the government to the students, the college also has some of its own welfare schemes for the students. The details are as under:

- Free education, residence and food for outstanding students in sports and cultural activities.
- Fee concession for fatherless/orphan students.
- Fee concession and Book-Bank facility for economically weaker students.
- Special fee concession for “Amritdhari” students.
- Concessional bus passes for the needy students travelling from the rural and far-flung areas.
- Bus facility for the girls on concessional charges.
- Various medical camps are organized from time to time.
- Free uniforms and turbans to the poor students.
- The students are provided primary medical services through the college Health Care Centre. In case of emergency the college has ambulance to cater this need. Varied medical camps are organized from time to time.
- Students are facilitated to avail education loans.
- If any student gets injured during any college event, he/she is taken care off completely by the institution and all the medical expenses are borne.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The college has started 16 PG courses including those which are not available in other colleges situated in the district which provide an opportunity to the under-graduate students to move to post-graduate courses. Our hope is not belied because the proportion of the students in these courses is quite considerable. Moreover, there is facility of Girls' Hostel and transport for girls to take them to higher education. The college also offers employment to meritorious students. Moreover, various cells of the college i.e. Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Competitive Exam Cell, etc. train them to do well in different competitive examinations and interviews and prepare them for jobs. The teachers also motivate the students either to go for higher education or vocational industry-oriented courses to look for suitable employment.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The college takes extra care of those students who are at risk of failure and dropout in the following way:

- The institution helps the students who are at risk of failure and dropouts by conducting special remedial classes which help them in improving their academic performance.
- Special attention is paid to the slow learners by the class in-charges by informing the parents about their ward.
- Groups of weak and bright students are constituted so that the bright students can help the weak students to solve their problems.
- Moreover, the special tests are conducted to help them to prepare for their final exams.
- Financial aid/ fee concession is also provided to the students who are facing financial problem to continue their study.
- Psychological counseling, if needed, is also offered to the students.
- The college focuses on curbing anti-social activities such as ragging, indiscipline etc., which may otherwise become cause of dropping out of the students.
- To remove the language barrier for such students, mother tongue, if necessary, is used as a mode of instruction.



5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

Sports:

The vision of the institution with regards to sports and games is pursued through the Department of Physical Education. This Department not only nurtures sports talent but also creates atmosphere for achieving excellence. The college offers a variety of games to students. Students (male and female) have participated in hockey, football, handball, wrestling, badminton, basketball, volleyball, table-tennis, chess, boxing, kabaddi, gatka, wushu, sepak takraw, canoeing & kayaking, tug-of-war, kho-kho, judo and various track and field events of athletics.

A number of students are members of the sports wings of Punjabi University, Patiala and the Sports Department of Punjab relating to different games i.e., volleyball, basketball, canoeing, kayaking, wushu, rowing, and football.

Cultural activities:

Cultural roots are an important determinant for the personality traits of the students. The very aim of the college is to ensure overall development of the students. The cultural activities play an important role in developing the confidence level of the students and giving them the platform to show their talent. Youth Welfare Department of the college, therefore, always makes sure that the students understand their cultural background and provides them the opportunities to participate in these activities to the maximum possible extent.

The students participate in Zonal, Inter-Zonal youth festivals and Inter-zonal of the affiliating university along with North-Zone and All India Inter-University Youth Festivals. 5. To make the students skilled and productive.
6. All round development of the students.
7. To groom the students intellectually providing congenial ambience.
8. To enable the youth to become tomorrow's leaders of change.
9. To provide educational opportunities to the unprivileged sections of the society.

The institution strives to bridge the educational gap among the people belonging to different economical, social, ethnic, and geographic strata of the society, providing an easy access to education for everyone without discrimination in view to use education as a tool to the overall development of the society. It aims to enable the students to possess intellectual and personal competencies so that they may become good citizens and contribute to the development of the



society. To match with the current requirements of the society, the college strives to provide all kinds of facilities and exposure to the students so that they can easily face the new challenges.

The distinctive characteristics of the institution are:

- Majority of the students belong to rural areas and economically weaker sections of the society. The college has thus, made higher education accessible for the people of this backward belt of Punjab.
- The college focuses on the education of rural girls as it is reflected from the growing number of girl students in the college strength.

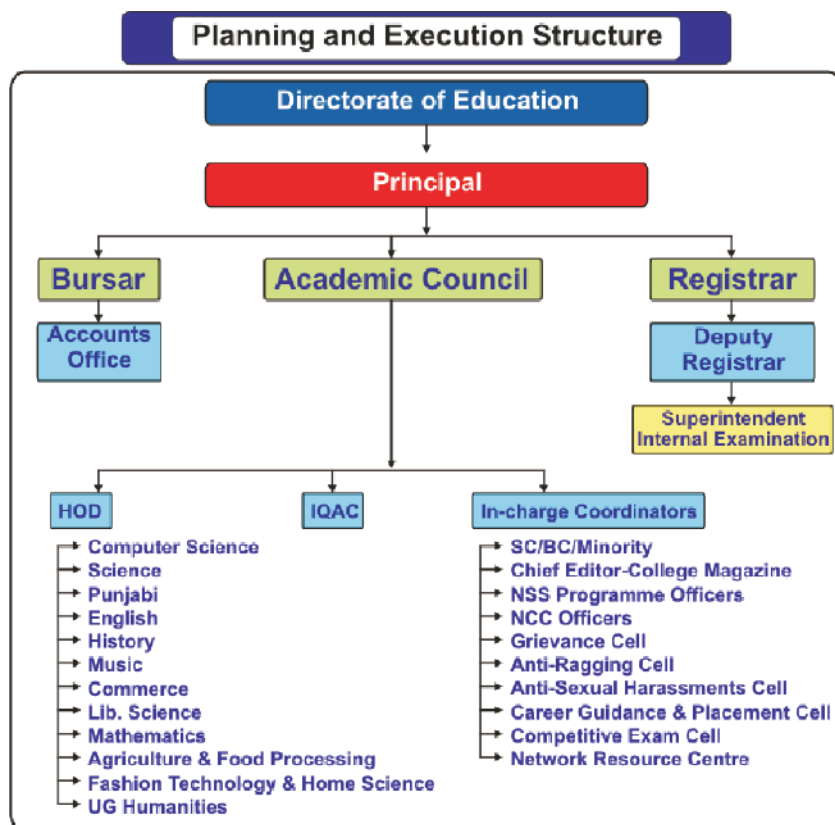

The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

The Principal runs the college affairs along with the Vice-principal, Academic Council, HOD's, LMC (Local Managing Committee), the Directorate of Education, and the governing body. Moreover, the Principal ensures the active participation of both teaching and non-teaching staff in



the management in the form of various committees to achieve the stated mission and objectives of the college.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

Prior to the commencement of the new session, the different committees, Academic Council, and HOD's conduct meetings with the Principal in order to frame action plans regarding their respective tasks to be implemented during the forthcoming session in the best possible way following systematical procedures. The Principal along with the Academic Council constantly monitors the implementation of the action plan through feedback, taken from the stakeholders and regular staff meetings.

Interaction with stakeholders:

The entire leadership of the college interacts with students and their parents, alumni, members of the Management Committee, faculty members and other stakeholders through regular meetings with them. The college focuses on the open door policy which facilitates the stakeholder to interact with the Principal easily to convey their suggestions, feedback and even grievances, if any.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders:

The leadership follows all the valuable suggestions and feedback, given time to time from each and every one. The suggestions and feedback are incorporated into action plans to enhance the academic and infrastructural aspects of the college. 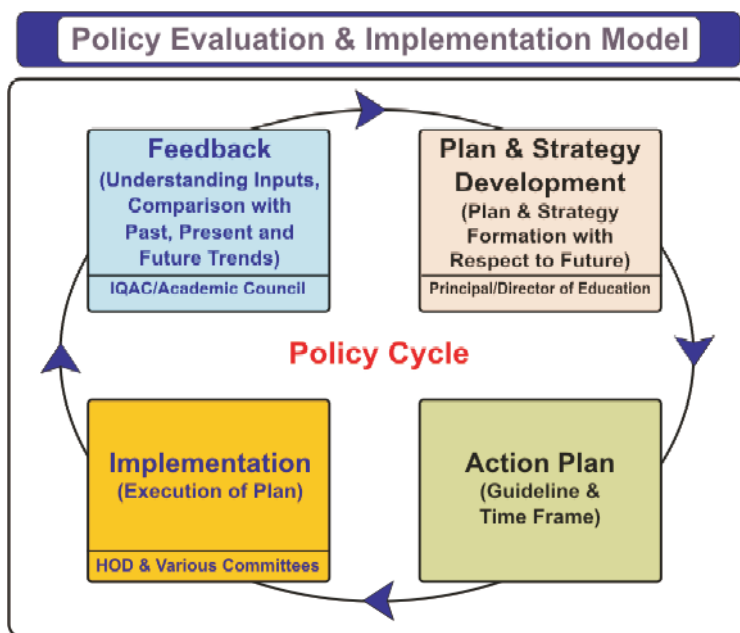

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top Management?

The college provides the faculty members with an opportunity to develop their leadership skills by enabling them to shoulder the responsibilities within the institution. The Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, Sri Amritsar Sahib (SGPC), the governing body of the college, has always been supportive for the development of the college at all levels and gives its faculty members with all opportunities to participate and groom their leadership qualities.

The faculty members are represented in the IQAC, Academic Council, LMC and various administrative, management, and departmental committees as coordinators, convenors and members. They are also assigned the responsibilities as Registrar, Bursar, Nodal officer, NCC and NSS officers who hold certain authority and responsibilities to complete the desired academic and extra-curricular activities in the best possible manner within the stipulated time. Faculty training programs are conducted by the college to refurbish the aforementioned drive. In addition to this, conferences and workshops at national and international level are organized by the faculty for which tremendous appreciation and support is rendered by the administration and other concerned sections of the college.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college makes all the efforts in view to groom the leadership qualities among the faculty as well as students at various levels. The faculty members and students are provided with different kinds of opportunities and platforms to expose their hidden potential by assigning them different kinds of duties and responsibilities. Leadership at various levels is groomed by the college in the following manner:

- The faculty members are involved in various committees of the college to groom the leadership quality among them. There are several clubs / associations in the college with a large number of students as their members in which the responsibilities of managing and organizing of different events are given to them under the guidance of teacher- in- charge.
- The NCC, NSS, and Youth Welfare Department are playing a prominent role in grooming leadership potential among the students by organizing various kinds of drives, camps, etc.



- The Class Representatives are nominated by the class In-charges on the basis of their overall performance. In addition to this, the students are also appointed as office bearers of various societies, clubs and associations, and members of editorial boards of the college.
- The students are motivated to organize departmental fests, programmes, and events, etc. independently under the guidance of their teachers to inculcate leadership qualities among them.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college Managing Body believes in fully decentralization of administration as the Principal, Vice-principal, Bursar, Registrar, Academic Council, HOD's and the conveners of different committees are free to execute their duties and responsibilities. They are always inspired to take initiatives for the betterment of the college. The various meetings are organized on regular basis in both formal and informal manner in which all the staff members share their ideas for improvement in the performance of their respective departments and the college. It provides an opportunity to the staff members to present their innovative ideas. The Heads of different departments and coordinators of various college committees are authorized to prepare and plan schedules of work, academic enrichment programmes, educational tours, time-tables, work-load etc. of their respective departments in consultation with other faculty members. They are also allowed to identify departmental needs in terms of equipment, books, furniture, faculty, support staff and other infrastructural facilities. The perspective plan has been realized with the construction of classrooms, 'Indoor Stadium', 'Girls' Hostel' and 'Academic Block' to provide an enriching environment for academic growth and stimulation. Moreover, an additional 'Academic Block' is also under construction to facilitate the introduction of new courses. The institute has got 10 acre land from the management for the development of 'Agriculture Research Centre'.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

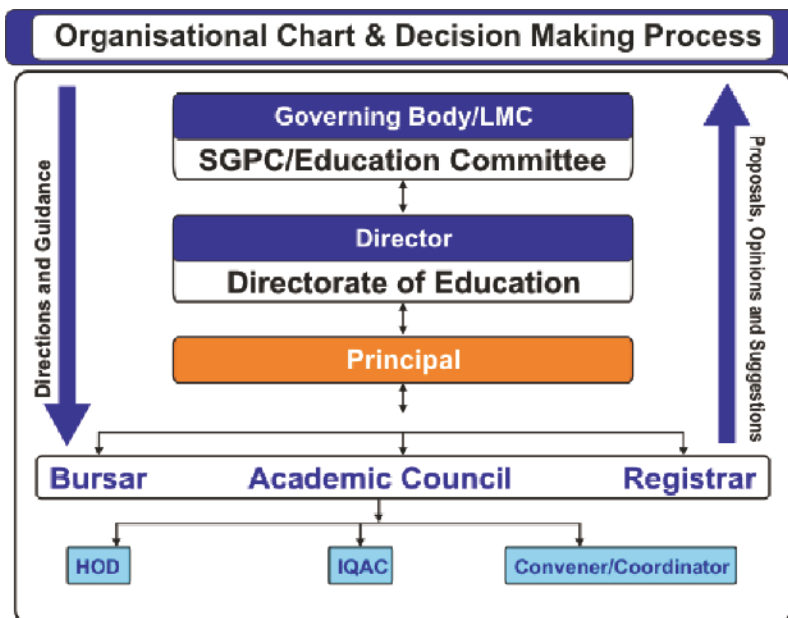

As indicated in the organization structure given in figures 6.1, 6.3 and 6.4 respectively, the Shiromani Gurdwara Prabadhak Committee (SGPC), Sri Amritsar Sahib is the Governing body of the college followed by the Directorate, Education (Chandigarh) to formulate all major policies at



macro level on the basis of the feedbacks of different stake holders and oversee the overall functioning of the college. All the academic and administrative decisions at micro level are made and further action plans are chalked out by the Principal, Bursar, Academic Council and Registrar collaboratively. The college has followed a system of decentralization in which all action plans are properly executed and evaluated involving all HODs', IQAC and co-coordinators of different committees, formed for conducting various activities and programmes for the smooth running of the college.

Teaching & Learning

The college is committed to make the teaching and learning 'student-centric' and experience of students memorable and everlasting so that it is rewarding in every sense. This commitment includes:

- Use of, apart from lecture method of teaching, new styles and methods of teaching pedagogy.
- Introduction of new, market relevant and innovative courses.
- Effective implementation of curricula.
- Providing real-life learning experiences to students by organizing field trips, industry visits, internships and extension lectures.
- Remedial classes for weak students and slow learners.
- Motivating the teachers to participate in faculty development programmes such as orientation



programmes, refresher courses, faculty development short term courses, seminars and workshops, organized by different universities, colleges and other reputed institutions.

- Organization of workshops, seminars, conferences at national and international level.
- Organization of guest lectures on technical skills, personality development, stress management, time management and other various fields.
- Encouragement of the students to have with tremendous aptitude and self-motivation to share their approaches to learning with their fellow students.
- A hi-tech central library, well-stocked with all kinds of printed and e-resources catering to the multidimensional academic as well as intellectual requirements of both faculty and students.

Research & Development:

The college has formulated 'Research Committee' for the development of research culture in the institution. Various steps, taken and strategies, adopted for research development are as follows:

- Publication of journals and magazines by various departments of the college.
- Various workshops/training programmes are organized for students and faculty to encourage them towards research and to make them learn new research tools and methodology.
- Encouragement of faculty for attending conferences, seminars and workshops by providing necessary financial support.
- Motivation of faculty members to pursue research work leading to the degree of Ph.D by allowing them to attend their course work classes.
- Establishment of 'Research and Information Resource Center' to facilitate the researchers for their research.

Community Engagement:

The Local Management Committee (LMC) of the college contains representatives of the local community, thus ensuring community engagement in the institution's decision making. Besides, community engagement is ensured in the following ways:

- The NSS and NCC wings of the college are involved in community engagement. The NSS wing of the college has adopted one village. The NSS wing coordinates with the village panchayats for organizing various cleanliness drives, plantation drives, awareness rallies, organizing adult education programmes and various extension lectures, etc.



- To enhance community engagement Yoga camps are organized.
- The College has various clubs by the means of which the college takes joint initiatives involving general community.
- Women Day, Environment Day, AIDS Awareness Day etc. are observed by the college to make, general community sentient about these issues.
- The college staff also contributes in 'Cancer Aid Fund' and 'Flood Relief Fund'.

Human resource management:

The college ensures a dedicated team of working professionals in the following ways:

- Selection of the regular/ad-hoc staff is done purely on merit basis as per the guidelines of UGC/affiliating university/Punjab government.
- The staff is given salary and allowances as per the norms of UGC/Punjab government. They are ensured an annual increment on the basis of performance. As per the government norms, all types of leaves such as casual leave, medical leave, etc. are accorded to the staff members.
- The regular teachers, under the 'Career Advancement Scheme', are ensured for their promotion on the basis of their API score.
- The regular staff members are also provided Provident Fund, Gratuity, Leave Encashment, etc. at the time of their retirement.
- Temporary/contractual staff having good performance is continued in the successive session.
- Workload, as per the norms of UGC/ Punjabi University, is distributed among the staff members.
- Staff members with excellent performance are encouraged by assuring financial incentives in the form of special increment along with recognition and awards.
- Staff members are facilitated to participate in conferences, workshops, orientations and refresher courses etc. for their career advancement.

Industry interaction:

The college has established 'Career Guidance and Placement Cell' to provide interaction with the industry. The steps taken in this direction include:

- MOU's have been signed with various companies and industries of different fields to provide training and placement to the students.



- Reputed companies are invited to ensure placements for the final year students of the college.
- The college organizes industrial tours and study visits every year to provide practical exposure to the students.
- Expert lectures and interactive sessions with the industry leaders are organized to serve the purpose.
- Various departments arrange field work, industrial visits and internships in various companies for the students.

The Principal of the college, being the head of the institution, has a pivotal role to lead and direct all the activities, organized by the various departments. The same is conveyed to the top management by the Principal in the various meetings of the Local Management Committee (LMC) and the Governing Body of the institution. The college Prospectus presents the overall image of the college demonstrating its various programs, mission and activities to both management and stakeholders. 6.2.11 Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the institution has a mechanism for analyzing students' feedback on institutional performance. The feedback is collected from the students through feedback proformas and the complaint/suggestion boxes installed at strategic positions in the college campus. Moreover, the feedback is gathered from the interaction of the teachers with the students. The collected feedback is thoroughly analysed by the authorities and imperative steps are taken to improve the institutional performance. To ameliorate the process, the college has recently set up IQAC. This process has brought tremendous improvement in teaching learning process, admission process, infrastructure facilities, library, student support, transportation, cafeteria, etc.



6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The college tries its best to enhance the professional development of its teaching as well as non-teaching staff. Some of the efforts, made in this direction include:

- Duty leave along with financial aid is sanctioned to the teaching faculty to participate in workshops, seminars, conferences, etc.
- The faculty is allowed to attend refresher courses, orientation programmes and faculty development programmes.
- The faculty is encouraged to pursue for M.Phil. and Ph.D to enhance their professional qualifications. Incentives, as per the rules, are given to the teachers, having Ph.D.
- The teaching staff is equipped with various library facilities such as e-resources, books, journals, magazines, etc. to assist them in their research.
- In-house training /computer workshops, whenever needed, are organized for the non-teaching staff to sharpen their technical skills.

The faculty of any institution is its foundation and its smooth functioning depends upon the motivated faculty. To motivate the employees for the divergent roles and responsibilities they perform, the following strategies are adopted by the institution:

- Faculty members are facilitated to attend workshops, refresher courses, orientation programmes, faculty development programmes, etc.
- Eminent academicians and experts are invited from time to time for guest lectures and interaction with the staff.
- In-house faculty training to equip the staff with the latest technology is conducted.
- Faculty members are involved in the activities of the college by enlisting them in various committees. They are given adequate freedom to execute the assigned roles and responsibilities.



- The employees, having excellent contribution in the activities of the college are duly appreciated and honoured in the college functions.
- The regular faculty is ensured to get the salary in time and as per UGC norms. Moreover, contractual/temporary staff members are also given handsome salary. Due promotion is given to them from time to time.
- Special increment is given to faculty members for their distinctive contribution in the development of the college.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The Management Committee has adopted CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) as per the guidelines of UGC. Under this system the faculty members have to fill self-assessment Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) proforma based on Academic Performance Indicators (API), prescribed by the affiliating university. This proforma contains information relating to multiple activities such as subjects taught, work-load, lectures delivered, teaching methods applied, participation in examination and evaluation activities, academic & professional growth, involvement in extra-curricular activities and college administrative work, research work etc. This proforma is verified by the college Principal and forwarded to the Management Committee for proper assessment. The assessment of non-teaching staff is done on the basis of allocated duties, in time completion of these duties, competence and responsibilities which are assigned to them.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The review of the performance appraisal reports by the Management has a lot of value in matters of career advancement. The staff members, having good performance are given due promotions and annual increments. If any staff member does not perform upto the required level, he/she is



intimated about the same so that he/she may bring required improvement in his/her work. Recognizing the performance of the staff in the improvement of the institution, a special increment to the entire staff of the college was given by the Governing Body in its meeting held on 26-02-2014.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non- teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

A number of welfare schemes are ensured for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The various welfare schemes include:

- Fee concession is given to the wards of the staff members.
- Group Health insurance scheme for the staff members.
- Loans against provident fund.
- Free uniforms are provided to the fourth class staff members.
- Retirement benefits such as Gratuity, Leave Encashment, etc.
- CPF and EPF.
- Maternity/paternity leaves.
- Day care center for the kids of the staff members.
- Hostel for female staff.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

As the college is under the management of the Shiromani Gurudwara Parbandhak Committee, a well-known and most respected organization, it enjoys a reputed place in the ambience. The following measures are taken to attract the faculty towards this institution:

- Liberal, lively and competitive environment is provided.



- The selection of the faculty is done according to the guidelines of UGC/Punjabi university/state Government.
- The salary including all allowances is given as per UGC/Punjabi University/state government norms.
- All facilities are provided to the faculty for their career advancement.
- Promotions and increments are accorded on due time.
- The female staff from faraway places is provided with hostel facility.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

As per the need of each unit of the college, the funds, as per UGC schemes, are allocated and grants are applied for the building/development projects of the institution. Moreover, the state government rules concerning expenditure of funds are followed strictly. This involves calling quotations from the market for purchasing of any item. Moreover, the purchase committees are constituted for various purchases of the college. The quotations are sought from at least three suppliers and the orders are placed to the suppliers who offer to supply the item at the lowest price within the time frame without compromising with the quality. The college Bursar monitors the entire process of expenditure and helps the Principal in effective and efficient use of financial resources. The conveners of various committees have to seek the formal approval from the Principal for spending a specified sum of money in order to execute the work. The recurring expenses are sanctioned at the level of the Principal whereas for the non-recurring expenses (capital expenditure), the approval of the Management is obtained. All payments are supported by the vouchers. The following three main accounts/statements are prepared under double entry system:

- Receipts and Payments account
- Income and Expenditure account
- Balance sheet

All the accounts are audited by an external qualified auditor, who visits the college on regular basis



for useful interaction with the concerned staff.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The audit of the college is done by an external chartered accountant, appointed by the management. Audit assignment is accomplished in two phases – first, after every month for monthly receipts & expenditure and then immediately after the completion of every financial year. Moreover, the audit is also done by Punjab Government for its expenditure as the institution is under the 95% Grant-in-aid Scheme of the Punjab Government. The last audit was done on 2015-16 and no audit objection was observed.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of previous four years and reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The institution collects adequate funds from:

- The students' fee
- Grants from the state government for the aided posts.
- Grants from UGC under various schemes
- Grants from the Governing Body

The college has not faced any deficit. Copies of audited income and expenditure statement of the last four years, duly attested by the Chartered Accountant are attached as Annuxure No.12

Apart from the major funding sources mentioned in 6.4.3, additional funds are collected through:

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

- a. Yes, our college has recently established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) as per the UGC guidelines in view to enhance quality in the different spheres of the college such as scholastics and co-scholastics activities. The meetings of the Cell are organized to discuss, frame and implement the policies to enhance quality in teaching and learning. The Cell receives feedback from students, parents and alumni to design the policies to achieve excellence.
 - b. The IQAC has put up many proposals relating to the enhancement of infrastructure, appointment of staff, teaching-learning methodologies, research and extra-curricular activities, etc. to the management/authorities after analyzing the feedback, collected from various stakeholders. The management/authorities have approved almost all proposals which are further have been implemented by the institution.
 - c. Yes, the IQAC has external members in its committee. These members are invited in the meetings of the IQAC to seek their valuable suggestions in order to enhance quality in various sphere of the college.
 - d. The students and alumni play an effective role in the functioning of the IQAC as they render valuable feedback that is beneficial to the overall improvement of the functioning of the college. The IQAC has a feedback system that enables the students to convey their suggestions



and ideas for uplifting the standard of the college.

- e. The faculty members and the representatives of administrative staff play a prominent role in the decision making and policy formation of the IQAC. In the analysis process of the feedback, taken from various stakeholders, all the representatives of different constituents of the institution participate wholeheartedly so that the college can take all corrective measures.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give detail on its operationalization.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. All the teaching departments, Academic Council, IQAC, committees, cells and administrative units work in coordination under the leadership of the Principal to ensure overall quality in all the functioning of the college. It is ensured by the Head of the institution that all staff members should be punctual and sincere towards their duties and responsibilities.

All the academic and administrative activities along with the methods and desired outcomes are planned in the meetings of respective departments/committees. Duties are assigned to concerned staff members who report to the authority after the completion of the task. The concerned HOD's/committees' conveners keep an eye on the progress of the activities constantly to ensure the quality. The feedback is also collected from the stake holders regarding the functioning and the level of quality.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If "yes", give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the institution provides training to its staff for the effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures.

- For the effective implementation of quality assurance and to boost up the academic and administrative working of the college, the teaching and non-teaching staff are always encouraged and permitted to attend the training programs and workshops to upgrade their skills and knowledge.
- The faculty members are given duty leaves for attending orientations, refreshers, conferences



and seminars, etc.

- The college also conducts orientation programmes for the new faculty members in the beginning of the academic session in order to teach them how to use new teaching methods, techniques, aids etc.
- The non-teaching staff is also given a special training about office automation and resource & data management.
- The laboratory and library staff members are also sent for attending the workshops in order to enhance their skills in their respective field.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, the institution undertakes Academic Audit that is done by the college administration, i.e., the Principal, Academic Council and various committees. The meetings of the committees are conducted from time to time to review the teaching-learning processes, available infrastructure and resources. Necessary corrective measures, if required, are taken. The affiliating university also inspects the college with respect to its infrastructure, faculty and other resources while any new course or subject is to be introduced.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities?

The internal quality assurance mechanisms are aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities by following all the guidelines laid down by the external bodies and regulatory bodies, i.e., Punjabi University, Patiala, state government, UGC, and the Governing Body.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

In order to review the teaching learning process, the college has the Academic Council, Registrar office, Examination Branch and IQAC. Apart from this, the HOD's along with the faculty members



of their respective departments also review the teaching learning process.

- The quality of the teaching learning process is reviewed by the analysis of students' performances in house tests, class tests, assignments and final university exams.
- The teachers are supposed to prepare the curriculum diary/course file having all the details of lesson plans, teaching methods, etc. The course files, lesson plans and other teaching materials are assessed by the HOD's, Academic Council and IQAC.
- The feedback relating to curriculum delivery and effectiveness of the teaching is periodically taken from the students.
- In the meetings of Academic Council, IQAC, Registrar, HOD's and other conveners, presided by the Principal, all the matters, suggestions and other inputs are properly considered and reviewed and appropriate steps are taken to improve the quality in teaching learning practices accordingly.

On the basis of this mechanism, the college is always inclined to adopt new pedagogical methodologies and approaches in order to improve the teaching learning programmes and practices.

Criterion-VII: Innovations & Best Practices





7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The college is aware about its responsibilities towards the conservation of environment and makes efforts to inculcate eco-friendly habits among the students. Although the college has not conducted a formal Green Audit of the campus, the various committees and clubs of the college like NSS, NCC, Green Brigade, Water Management Committee, Electricity & Power Management Committee, Maintenance Committee, and Transportation Committee provide their valuable contribution for making the campus eco-friendly. These committees and clubs help to identify the environmental concerns by examining the college facilities like transportation, laboratories, canteens, hostel, electrical/electronic devices, i.e. computers, air-conditioners, fans, water coolers, pumps, lights, refrigerators, transformers, Power generator, etc. to monitor their waste generation, energy consumption and efficiency. This indirect/informal Green Audit helps in coining corrective measures and preparing the future action plan to preserve the environmental interests.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- **Energy conservation**
- **Use of renewable energy**
- **Water harvesting**
- **Check dam construction**
- **Efforts for Carbon neutrality**
- **Plantation**
- **Hazardous waste management**
- **e-waste management**

Energy conservation:

- Electricity and Power Management Committee has been established in the college to ensure efficient use of energy in the college campus.
- The Committee ensures proper and timely maintenance of all the electric & electronic devices of the college.



- The Committee also monitors energy usage of the college regularly.
- The college organizes various awareness programmes to motivate the students and faculty to save energy.
- There is a provision of centralized control of electricity in classrooms and labs.
- Motivating slogans about energy conservation are displayed at different places inside the college campus.
- The staff and students are encouraged and instructed to switch off lights, fans, air conditioners, computers, lab equipments and other electric devices immediately after their use.
- Class rooms have been constructed in such a way that allows enough natural light.
- There is sufficient cross ventilation in the rooms that helps in minimizing the use of electricity.
- Energy saving LEDs & CFLs, in place of incandescent light bulbs, are used.
- LCDs/LEDs, instead of CRT monitors for computers, are utilized.
- Energy efficient and star rated electric appliances like air-conditioners, fans, transformers etc. have been installed.
- Speed governors have been installed in the college buses. It not only ensures safety of the passengers by limiting the speed but also reduces fuel consumption. The college vehicles are timely serviced to keep them fuel efficient.

Use of renewable energy:

- There is a proposal for solar geyser in the hostel to provide hot water during winter season and solar street lights in the campus.

Water harvesting:

- The college has bore-well filter systems at various places to harvest rain water. This arrangement helps in recharging the ground water and raising the water level during rainy season.
- The water tanks of the college campus are fitted with alarms to decrease wastage of water.
- The sewerage treatment plant is also being installed in the college to treat waste water of the hostel and washrooms. The treated water will be further used to irrigate plants and lawns in the college.



Check dam construction:

As the institution is located in the plain area, surrounded by the agricultural fields, there is no need of check dam construction.

Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

- To save paper, whenever possible, correspondence is done via e-mails.
- Regular maintenance of the college vehicles and electrical appliances is done to keep them energy efficient and minimize pollution.
- Use of energy efficient appliances like LED/CFL lights, fans, air-conditioners etc, in the campus also helps in saving energy and reducing carbon footprints.
- Putting waste paper, polythene bags, plants' dry leaves & branches on fire is prohibited in the college campus.
- Waste paper, e-waste, polythene bags, plastic goods and damaged devices are sent for re cycling.
- Faculty members share cars/transport whenever possible to reduce carbon footprints.
- The students and faculty members are encouraged to use bi-cycles instead of motor vehicles. The college provides free of cost bi-cycle parking facility in the campus.
- The students are also encouraged to use public transport instead of personal vehicles. The college provides concessional bus pass facility to all the students and dedicated college bus facility to the girls.
- College buildings, rooms and offices are surrounded by trees, plants and lawns to maintain carbon neutrality.
- Four wheelers are strictly banned for the students in the college campus.
- The college allows only those vehicles having pollution free certificates to enter the campus.

Plantation

- Both NSS wing and Green Brigade of the college organize frequent plantation drives not only inside but also outside the college premises.
- The college Green Brigade encourages students and faculty members to donate plants on their birthday and other special occasions. These saplings are planted in the college campus. The



brigade has also planted the plants of various species in the campus which release 24 hours oxygen.

- The Birthday of Sri Guru Har Rai Ji, (the 7th Guru of the Sikhs) is celebrated as Environment day on a large scale with great fervour. As per the directions of the Management Committee, SGPC, Sri Amritsar Sahib, this day has been declared as 'World Sikh Environment Day' and it is mandatory for all the educational institutions under the Management Committee to celebrate it as such.
- A large number of trees and plants of various varieties are planted all around the college buildings and regularly maintained. The college has a well maintained botanical garden, parks and spacious lawns. With the joint efforts of the Green Brigade, NSS and NCC, the institution has also undertaken various joint plantation drives in collaboration with the village 'Panchayats'.
- The Department of Agriculture has established 'Agriculture Research Center', in which they practices cultivation relating to floriculture, horticulture and organic medicinal plants.
- The Campus Beautification Committee looks after the general aesthetic aspects of the campus and its surroundings. The overall purpose is not only to impart a green look to the campus and its surroundings but to maintain sound ecological health.

E-waste Management:

- The College Management is also taking the responsibility to manage e-waste. The damaged computers are used by the instructors in the practical sessions of the 'Add-On Course in Computer Hardware and Networking'. By doing this the students can learn about the hardware components of computer without any risk of damaging the components of working computers and thus e-waste is also utilized.
- The college also organizes competitions on e-waste art. These competitions provide a platform to bring creativity of the students out in the form of art. Waste compact discs and other waste materials are used by the students for decoration and participation in competitions on 'Art from Waste'.
- Unused waste materials are collected and handed over to an external e-waste recycling agency.



Hazardous waste management:

The College Management is also taking some serious steps to manage hazardous waste. Different types of wastes in Chemistry and Biology labs are kept in different colored bins and further sent to be disposed of.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

During the last four years there is tremendous improvement in all the aspects of the college due to innovative practices. The details of innovative practices are given below:

- Novel skill development and job-oriented courses such as B. Voc. (Software Development), B. Voc. (Fashion Technology), and B. Voc. (Food Processing).
- This is the only college to commence such courses in District Mansa of Punjab and among the 92 institutions of the country, selected by the UGC to start these courses.
- Introduction of choice-based credit system with multiple entry and exit points for the above mentioned courses.
- Introduction of innovative syllabi of such courses, meeting the market demands for job seekers.
- Add-on courses in Computer Hardware & Networking, Web Designing, Fashion Designing, and Spoken English are introduced to equip the students with supplementary skills.
- Introduction of ICT enabled pedagogical tools such as projectors, smart boards, digital visualizers, power point presentations, audio-video teaching material to make teaching learning process interesting and effective.
- Introduction of course file and lesson plans for effective curriculum delivery.
- The college library has its inbuilt e-library catering to the diversified information requirements of both faculty and students by providing them with an easy access to all online electronic resources through different consortia, i.e. N-LIST and DELNET, etc.
- To improve communication skills and pronunciation of the students, the college has created a special 'Language Lab', furnished with latest technology and software.
- Organization of guest lectures by renowned personalities from universities and industry to



equip the students with latest developments.

- Establishment of 'Competitive Exams Cell' to prepare the students for various competitive exams.
- Establishment of Book Bank to lend books to poor and needy students for the whole session.
- Remedial and boost-up classes for the weak and intelligent students respectively after analysis of the results of Mid-Semester tests.
- Commencement of journals by various departments of the college to promote research among the students and faculty members.
- Allocation of research projects to post-graduate students. Consequently students have written and got published their papers in reputed journals.
- Special provision finance for the proposed research projects of the students and faculty members by the Managing Committee.
- Constitution of 'Research Cell' consisting of senior faculty of the institution to guide the faculty members and students about funding agencies and various projects.
- Bar code technology has especially been applied in the circulation section of the college library in order to speed up and make the issue-return system more effective.
- Construction of indoor multipurpose stadium in such an effective way that it can also be used as multipurpose hall for organizing various events of the college.
- Library-cum-identity cards are internally prepared by the library staff and trainees using free software and special equipment in view to save a large amount of money that otherwise was to be spent on hiring of outsourcing agencies for the aforesaid purpose.
- The Department of Physical Education has setup 'Yoga Centre' to provide health services not only to the faculty members but also to community.
- The college has set up 'Media and Content Development Centre' to assist the faculty members in preparing teaching materials such as PowerPoint presentations, video lectures, audio lectures, etc.
- The college has subscribed a special portal 'Alma Bay' to connect students, faculty and alumni each other.
- The college has created 'Equal Opportunity Cell' to ensure equal opportunity for the



community at large and create socially conducive atmosphere for students belonging to different classes.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Title of the Practice 1: 'Cultural Activities and Sports'

Goals:

- To groom various traits and qualities among the students to sharpen their overall personality.
- To enhance the various skills and talents of the students so that they can excel in their respective fields.
- To inculcate personal qualities like competitiveness, leadership, communication, team work, coordination, confidence, and time management, etc. among the students.
- To bring physical, intellectual, and emotional competence among the students to transform them into productive ones.
- To enable the students to have better understanding of cultural diversity through participation in different cultural activities.
- To inculcate critical thinking and media literacy among the students.
- To instill the spirit of sportsmanship among the students.

Context:

Today the young generation is virtually on the verge of getting victimized of different kinds of social ills such as drugs, violence, materialism, individualism, etc. Moreover, arts, hobbies and leisure activities, which have been a prominent part and parcel of our life, are now being disappeared. The life of people has become so hectic that they hardly find spare time for their physical fitness. To keep the young generation away from such alarming threats and channelize their energy towards the right direction, the sports and cultural activities play a pivotal role. Moreover, these activities help to make a person self-disciplined, self-confident, determined, responsible, and patient. Therefore, in the aforesaid context, the college emphasizes on such activities along with



the academic curriculum discovering the strengths of students and providing a platform accordingly.

The Practice:

All the cultural activities which are to be conducted during the whole year by the college are planned in the beginning of the session. The students are motivated to participate in such activities, elaborating their major benefits. The selection of the students for these activities is made on the basis of trials and talent hunt. To train the students and facilitate their participation in such activities, the teachers are made in-charges of different cultural items as per their expertise and interest. Moreover, in accordance with the needs of the participants, external trainers and experts are hired to furnish their talent for competitions. The gamut of cultural activities for the students includes the participation in youth festivals at Zonal, Inter-zonal, North-Zone & All India Inter-university levels, Folk Festival of Punjabi University and Khalsai Youth Festival, organized by SGPC. The students compete in a variety of items such as Shabad Gayan, Classical Vocal, Ghazal, Indian & Western Group Song, Western Solo Song, Western Solo Instrument, Percussion and Non-percussion, Folk Song, Folk Orchestra, Indian Classical Dance, Folk Dance (Giddha & Bhangra), Waar Gayan, Kavishri Gayan, Folk Instrument, Drama, Mime, Skit, Mimicry, Poem Recitation, Debate, Elocution, Quiz, On the Spot Painting, Cartoon Making, Collage Making, Photography, Clay Modeling, Poster Making, Folk Crafts, etc. The students also participate in National and International concerts. The participants are provided with all kinds of accessories, required for the different items. In addition to this, they are also given refreshment at the time of rehearsals.

As it is rightly said that a healthy mind resides in a healthy body, the college dully emphasizes on sports activities along with its curriculum programme. The Department of Physical Education of the college plays a very important role to transform the above said mission into a ground reality. The sports activities of the college go on throughout the session. The sports persons participate in a variety of sports competitions, i.e., Annual sports meet of the college, Inter-college Competition, Inter-university Competition, National and International Competitions. The players of the college participate in different games, i.e., Kabaddi (National & Circle Style), Chess, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Sepak Takraw, Table Tennis, Badminton, Yoga, Wrestling, Cricket, Volleyball, Basketball, Canoeing, Kayaking, Wushu, Rowing, Football, Hockey, etc. A number of students are the



members of the sports wings of Punjabi University, Patiala and the Sports Department of Punjab relating to different games, i.e., Volleyball, Basketball, Canoeing, Kayaking, Wushu, Rowing and Football. Prior to sports competitions, the training camps for the players are conducted and special coaches are hired for this purpose. The college provides not only free sports equipment and kits to the players but also boarding and lodging. The college has also constructed an indoor stadium and gymnasium. - Many participants belong to poor families and are unable to purchase expensive sports equipment. So they feel hesitation to participate in such activities.
- As the college is situated in the backward remote area, it lacks the basic amenities such as excellent coaches and instructors, which are required to groom the students in sports and other activities.
- Some extra-curricular activities require World-class infrastructure and material that the college can hardly afford to provide.

The college always looks forward in conducting extra-curricular activities. It takes the difficulty, if any, as a challenge and transforms it into a big success. The college always motivates and facilitates its students to participate in various kinds of sports and cultural activities, rendering all kinds of financial, technical and other requisite help. Title of the Practice 2: 'Empowerment of Rural Girl'

Context

"If you educate a man you educate an individual, but if you educate a woman you educate a family"

The mission of the college is to empower the society through education. No educational institution can keep its eyes closed towards the limitations of its local community and it is utmost important to do all possible efforts to create appropriate social atmosphere. The college is situated in such an area which is generally considered as one of the backward belts of the Punjab and surrounded by rural community. Therefore, the college is well determined to do its level best for the betterment of the rural community. According to the Census 2011, sex ratio in rural area of the district is 881 females per 1000 males and rural female literacy rate is only 51.74% that is very scanty. So the college has taken an initiative to make rural girls' education as its best practice as it would impact not only the future social-cultural fabric of the society but is also very crucial in shaping and moulding the attitude and behaviour of future generations of the country.

Objectives

- To focus on the situation analysis at grass root level to understand the problems of the rural girl students.
- To facilitate a suitable social atmosphere for rural girls' education.
- To propagate the importance of girls' education in the community.
- To empower girls through education and encourage them to participate in extra-curricular activities.
- To eradicate the social evils in the region through education.
- To make the girls economically self-dependent.
- To ensure the female contribution in the development of the society.

Practice

The college has very much realized the fact that both boys and girls are equally important for the development of society as it has emphasized on equity in imparting education to them. The college has used education and extra-curricular activities as a tool to empower the rural girls harnessing their unseen potential and skills.



- The faculty members of the college visit different villages of the region to make the residents aware of the significance of education & extra-curricular activities for girls, the status of the girls' education in the area and the available opportunities for them along with the variety of courses and facilities, being offered by the college involving the village panchayats and eminent local personalities.
- The college conducts career counseling camps in rural schools to motivate the girls to pursue for higher education.
- The college organizes 'Crash Courses' free of cost for rural girls on Cooking, Tailoring, Computers, Spoken English, etc. which help to make them aware of different courses and other facilities, offered by the college and attract them towards higher study.
- To sensitize the students, parents and community, the college conducts guest lectures, seminars on women empowerment and girl education in the campus by involving the people of the local community.
- To facilitate the girls belonging to remote villages with safe and secured approach to the college, concessional transport facility is provided. It is worth mentioning that the college has expended a whopping amount of Rs. 14, 91,315/- during the last four years to keep on this subsidized transport service for them. The college has hostel facility in the campus for girls to accommodate those who belong to far flung areas.
- Keeping in view the safety and security concerns of the parents of the girls, the college has also provided them with separate common rooms, lawns and cafeteria. To ensure the safe and secured education for them in the campus, the college also emphasizes on discipline deputing its staff on proctorial duties. Moreover, the entire campus and buses are under CCTV surveillance.
- The college has established 'Women Empowerment' and 'Anti-Sexual Harassment' Cells.
- The college has started different skill development courses, especially focusing on girls' self-employment in the streams of 'Fashion Designing', 'Home Science', and 'Food Processing'.

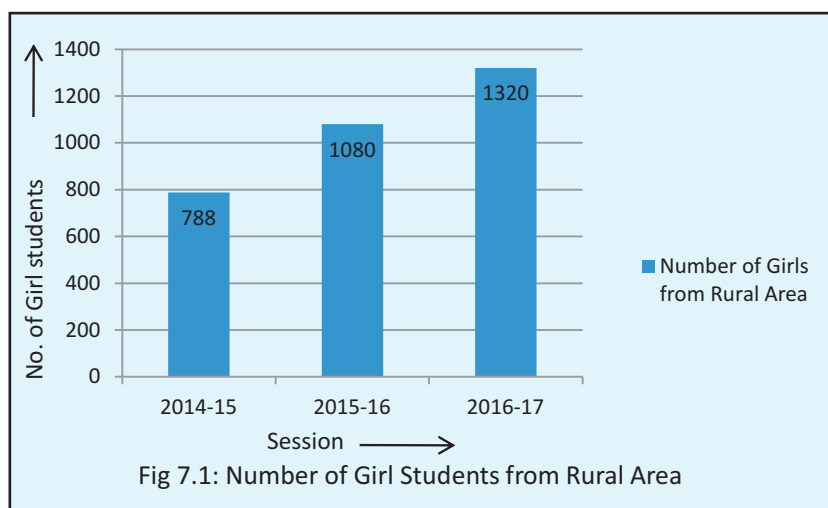
Evidence of Success:

This practice has succeeded to change the mindset of the villagers as they have started to allow their girls to pursue for higher education and participate in extra-curricular activities like Sports,

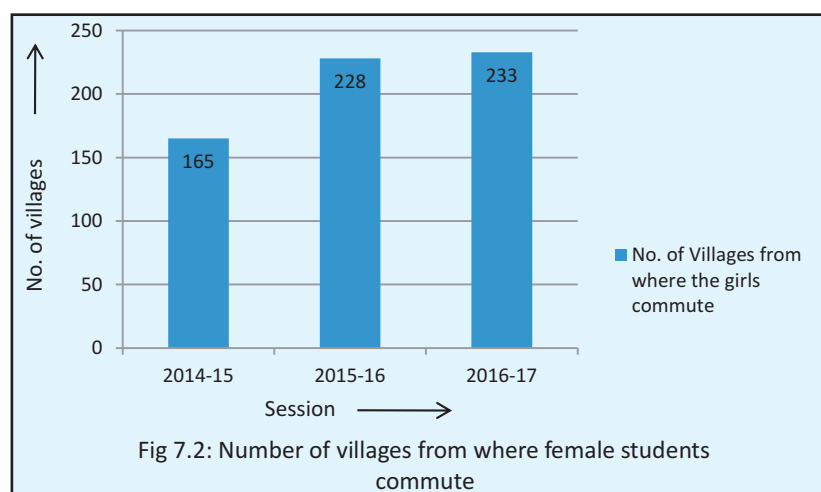

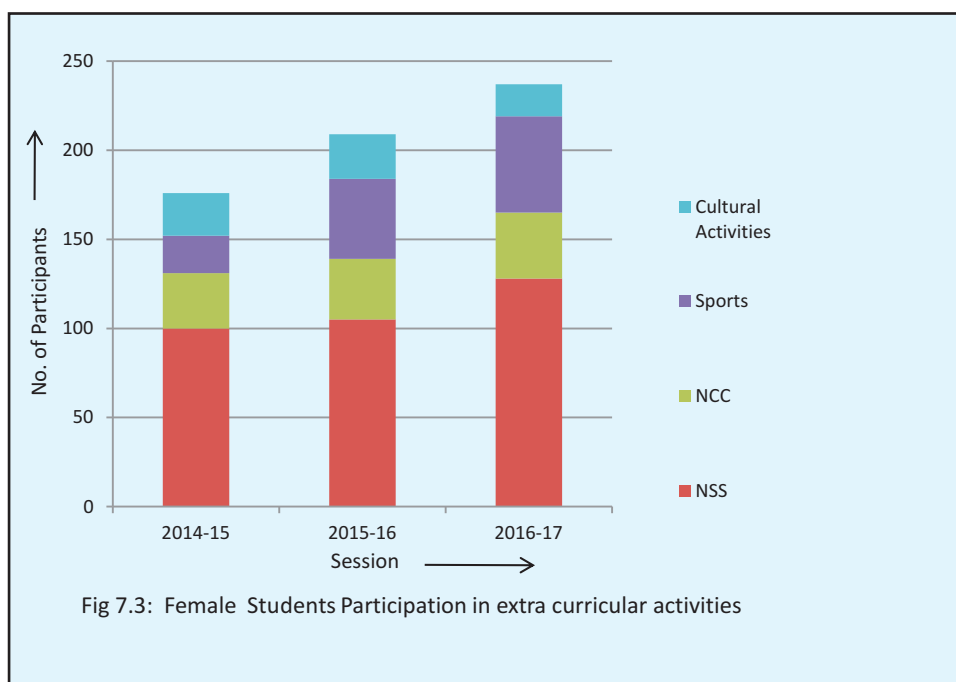


Fig 7.3: Female Students Participation in extra curricular activities

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- As the college is situated in the remote and backward area of Punjab where public transport facility is not so good, the major problem of the rural people is to send their children, especially girls, to the colleges.



- As compared to boys, most of the rural people feel hesitation to allow their girls to participate in extra-curricular activities.
- Owing to financial crunch most of the people of this belt are not in favour of investing much on the intellectual advancement of their girls.

There are some major financial, social and psychological problems which are especially linked with the community of this belt pose a big hindrance in the field of higher education of the rural girls. The college has taken up all these problems collectively as a big challenge to ensure 100% contribution from the foremost section of the society, i.e., females in the development of the society. Hence the college puts all its sincere efforts and resources to accomplish this mission.
